## **SUNDAY OF THE PASSION (Palm Sunday)**

**2020**

Today we enter the mystery of Christ's Passion, the greatest drama in human history. Our celebration this year will be very different. Gathering outside the Church, hearing the Gospel account of Christ's triumphal entry into Jerusalem, blessing and receiving palm crosses, processing into the Church carrying palm fronds singing *All glory, praise and honour to you, Redeemer King*, the Dramatic Reading of the Passion, the Eucharist – none of that will happen this year due to the restrictions placed upon our movements. It will be tough. It will also be quieter than previous years.

The readings for today and Good Friday are much longer than usual. Yet Jesus himself has very little to say. Before Pilate, he says nothing until Pilate asks, "Are you the King of Jews?" Jesus answers, "Well you say so." Yet when others accused him, he remained silent. How do you cross-examine someone when they refuse to answer? You can't. But you can still accuse them.

On the cross, Jesus uttered only seven sentences. Most of the time he just hung there silent. When he rose, he spoke a few words; in the Gospel of Mark none at all. What does that say about the way God chooses to come to us and the way God works in the world?

It's this silence of God we find most difficult to handle, especially in times of suffering. When someone we know loses a loved one or develops a serious illness, we find ourselves at a loss for words. "I don't know what to say." Nine times out of ten the person doesn't want or need words. What they need is a presence, someone to place a hand on their shoulder, to sit with them. But can we handle the silence of God?

Recently I saw again Martin Scorsese's movie, *Silence* based on the novel by Japanese writer Shusaku Endo. It's set in Nagasaki

in the 17<sup>th</sup> century. Two Portuguese Jesuit priests travel to Japan to find their mentor who is missing and rumoured to have apostatised. The movie graphically depicts the methods of torture used by the Japanese to force Christians to renounce their faith. It also follows the crisis of faith in the two priests especially Fr Sebastião Rodrigues played by Andrew Garfield. His struggle with the apparent silence of God in the face of unspeakable suffering tests his faith to the limit. At the end of the film this exchange between the priest and what he hears as the voice of the Lord takes place: "Lord, I fought against your silence." The Lord says, "I suffered beside you. I was never silent." Priest: "I know. But even if God had been silent my whole life. To this very day, everything I do, everything I've done speaks of him. It was in the silence I heard your voice."

There comes a point when we can be with a friend or spouse or family member and not have to talk all the time. It's enough simply to be together. We don't need noise. Presence is enough. Perhaps that's how we need to cultivate our relationship with God, to reach the point where we can be comfortable with the silence because we have the presence.

God doesn't ignore our suffering, but neither does God present a convincing argument on its value and how we can learn from it. The sufferings of Jesus included a sense of abandonment: "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" He struggled in the Garden, praying that he wouldn't have to go through with this awful ordeal. God comes right alongside us, close to us and suffers with us.

As we experience the new and radically different situation caused by COVID-19, God is close to us in our suffering. We can't be together for Holy Week and Easter this year but remember that years of prayer and celebrating the sacraments and reading the Bible has been equipping us to deal with it. Being in church is like a rehearsal or a preparation for times like this. Those times when

we gathered for the liturgy aimed to redirect us to God, the supreme value. That places our suffering in context. It has a larger purpose.

When God is silent how do we respond? Maybe our greatest challenge with God isn't that God doesn't care or heal or intervene, but that God doesn't care or heal or intervene when we want and in the way we want. As we journey with Jesus through this week, maybe we need to recognise that Jesus is free to come and go, free to speak and free to be silent. Will we worship such a God? Will you lay your life before this one who doesn't always act or speak when and in the way we desire? Even when he's silent?

Will you follow the way of Jesus this week?

## MAKING A SPIRITUAL COMMUNION



The practice of spiritual communion is the desire of a Christian for union with Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist. It can be used by anyone who cannot receive Holy Communion for some reason. The practice of spiritual communion has been used especially in times of persecution and in times of plagues. Some examples are the era of communism in the Eastern Bloc, which included state atheism and the current COVID-19 pandemic.

The Anglican precedent for spiritual communion is in the 1662 *Book of Common Prayer* in "The Order for the Visitation of the Sick and the Communion of the Sick." The rubrics at the end say that if anyone for any reason, such as "extremity of sickness . . . or any other just impediment" is unable to receive the Sacrament, then if he or she truly repents of his or her sins, and firmly believes that Jesus Christ died on the cross for our redemption, and if we remember the benefits we receive thereby and give "hearty thanks therefore" we truly eat and drink the body and blood of Christ profitably to our soul's health although we "do not receive the Sacrament with [our] mouth."

Here is a prayer for making a spiritual communion from the Anglican Diocese of Malaita, part of the Church of Melanesia, which you can use anywhere and at any time:

**In union, Dear Lord, with the faithful at every Altar of your Church, where your blessed Body and Blood are offered to the Father, I desire to offer you praise and thanksgiving. I present to you my soul and body, with the earnest desire that I may ever be united to you. And since I cannot now receive you sacramentally, I beseech you to come spiritually into my heart. I unite myself to you, and embrace you with all the affections of my soul. O let nothing ever separate me from you. Let me live and die in your love. Amen.**

We can use this time of distance and isolation as a sort of fast. We are fasting from meeting together with our brothers and sisters in Christ. We are fasting from praying and hearing the Word of God and celebrating the Eucharist together. Fasting, as opposed to starving, is something temporary. When we finally break the fast, the food we have denied ourselves is even more delicious and nourishing. If we've fasted from alcohol, the wine is even more delicious and invigorating. After this time has passed and we can meet together again and receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion there will be a great sense of relief, joy and celebration, but also a deeper appreciation for the richness of the nourishment we receive as members of the Body of Christ.

### 2020 GOOD FRIDAY & EASTER GIFT APPEAL

Good Friday and Easter will be celebrated this year during a time of great uncertainty and apprehension, even fear, as we find ourselves in uncharted territory due to the Coronavirus now impacting the world. In Australia, most of us are in lockdown, our churches are closed, and life is very different from what it was before.

We all feel our vulnerability. But we can give thanks to God that our hospitals and medical facilities are better equipped than many to respond to the illness. Sadly, for most of ABM's partners this is not the case.

This year's ABM Good Friday and Easter Gift Appeal focuses on two program areas.
