

A DIFFERENT HOLY WEEK AND EASTER

This Easter will be unlike any we've known. Churches have adapted quickly and imaginatively to the current situation with live-streaming, video messages, face-time media and other ways of keeping in touch with their parishioners and others. This week, as well as the bulletin, you will receive the orders of service for the liturgies of the Easter Triduum. Use the readings and prayers any way you see fit. Also, you can use the form of prayer for making a spiritual communion. I encourage you to set aside some time to pray, read and reflect on the significance of these days.

On **Holy Thursday** (or **Maundy Thursday**) we hear about Jesus' washing the feet of his twelve Apostles. Jesus gets down on his hands and knees, dressed as a slave with a towel around his waist, and serves us. He commands us to do the same. Love means serving others. "For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you" (John 13:15). We also commemorate the institution of the Eucharist at Jesus' Last Supper.

On **Good Friday** we remember Jesus' crucifixion and death. Normally, we do not celebrate the Eucharist but gather to recall Jesus' Passion, to pray for the world, and to venerate the cross, then we receive Holy Communion from the Sacrament reserved from the Maundy Thursday Eucharist. Being unable to gather for the liturgy this year, read the account of Jesus Passion and use a cross (perhaps your palm cross) and remember with gratitude the sacrifice Jesus made.

Holy Saturday is a quiet day as we remember that Christ is in the tomb. At night, we normally celebrate the Easter Vigil. The New Fire is lit and the Paschal Candle is lit from it and carried into the darkened church as we sing, "the Light of Christ." We hear readings rehearsing God's saving acts in creation, the flood, the exodus, and finally the death and resurrection of Jesus. We gather around the font to renew our baptismal vows and are then sprinkled with water to remind us of our baptism. We then celebrate the joy of the first Eucharist of Easter. Renew your baptism vows.

Easter Day is not just the culmination of Holy Week but the beginning of a whole new *way* of life. Every time we celebrate Mass we celebrate these events; every Sunday is Easter. Every communion is a resurrection. This year make a spiritual communion and remember Jesus' love, service, and sacrifice are present to us. Always.

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles Chapter 10, verses 34 – 43

Then Peter began to speak to them: 'I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ—he is Lord of all. That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name.'

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew Chapter 28, verses 1 – 10

Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ

After the sabbath, as the first day of the week was dawning, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to see the tomb. And suddenly there was a great earthquake; for an angel of the Lord, descending from heaven, came and rolled back the stone and sat on it. His appearance was like lightning, and his clothing white as snow. For fear of him the guards shook and became like dead men. But the angel said to the women, 'Do not be afraid; I know that you are looking for Jesus who was crucified. He is not here; for he has been raised, as he said. Come, see the place where he lay. Then go quickly and tell his disciples, "He has been raised from the dead, and indeed he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him." This is my message for you.' MAKING A SPIRITUAL COMMUNION



The practice of spiritual communion is the desire of a Christian for union with Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist. It can be used by anyone who cannot receive Holy Communion for some reason. The practice of spiritual communion has been used especially in times of persecution and in times of plagues. Some examples are the era of communism in the Eastern Bloc, which included state atheism and the current COVID-19 pandemic.

The Anglican precedent for spiritual communion is in the 1662 Book of Common Prayer in "The Order for the Visitation of the Sick and the Communion of the Sick." The rubrics at the end say that if anyone for any reason, such as "extremity of sickness . . . or any other just impediment" is unable to receive the Sacrament, then if he or she truly repents of his or her sins, and firmly believes that Jesus Christ died on the cross for our redemption, and if we remember the benefits we receive thereby and give "hearty thanks therefore" we truly eat and drink the body and blood of Christ profitably to our soul's health although we "do not receive the Sacrament with [our] mouth."

Here is a prayer for making a spiritual communion from the Anglican Diocese of Malaita, part of the Church of Melanesia, which you can use anywhere and at any time:

In union, Dear Lord, with the faithful at every Altar of your Church, where your blessed Body and Blood are offered to the Father, I desire to offer you praise and thanksgiving. I present to you my soul and body, with the earnest desire that I may ever be united to you. And since I cannot now receive you sacramentally, I beseech you to come spiritually into my heart. I unite myself to you, and embrace you with all the affections of my soul. O let nothing ever separate me from you. Let me live and die in your love. Amen.

We can use this time of distance and isolation as a sort of fast. We are fasting from meeting together with our brothers and sisters in Christ. We are fasting from praying and hearing the Word of God and celebrating the Eucharist together. Fasting, as opposed to starving, is something temporary. When we finally break the fast, the food we have denied ourselves is even more delicious and nourishing. If we've fasted from alcohol, the wine is even more delicious and invigorating. After this time has passed and we can meet together again and receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion there will be a great sense of relief, joy and celebration, but also a deeper appreciation for the richness of the nourishment we receive as members of the Body of Christ.
