WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE FREE?

Last Sunday, Fr Roy wrote about the cry for freedom from many during the COVID-19 pandemic. At first, protests seemed to be confined to the United States. Now, many here in Australia we are seeing protests using freedom as a support for their actions.

Fr Casey Cole OFM is an American Franciscan friar, priest, writer, and blogger. In one of his YouTube segments (and much of the following material is based on it) he talks about people protesting limits on their freedom like staying indoors, being unable to go to work, seeing their businesses fail, and so on. Pictures of some of the signs tell it all: 'My Body, My Choice Trump 2020', 'Defy Fascist Lockdown', 'Freedom is Essential', 'Don't Use Fear to Steal our Freedom', 'End this Siege Now', 'Give me Freedom or give me COVID-19', 'Jesus is My Vaccine.'

When contrasted with hospital workers, etc., putting their lives at risk to help COVID-19 patients and keep us safe, the sentiments expressed in these signs seem (in Casey Coles' words) "reckless, dangerous and selfish". They also express an ideology that sees freedom as far more individualistic and anarchist than a Christian understanding of freedom. They beg the question, "What does it mean to be free?" Many would answer that the more choices we have, the more free we are.

Fr Cole uses an example of two people both dying of thirst. The first person has a range of options to choose from: motor oil, hydrochloric acid, the liquid inside a lava lamp, a bottle of

Windex, and battery acid. The second person has only one choice: pure clean water. If more choices means more freedom to decide for yourself, the person with the greater range of options is more free. Really? According to this way of thinking, a person on the brink of death from dehydration and given a range of hazardous liquids to drink makes them freer than someone given only a glass of water? Do we want that level of freedom? It sees freedom as matter of quantity. Perfect freedom means unlimited choices. Therefore, anything that removes choices inhibits one's freedom.

Most people are willing to give up some freedoms to live in society: things like agreeing not to murder each other or steal each other's property. But there is only so much one can take – hence we have protests. Being told to wear a mask, to keep social distancing, not being able to go to church, practise social distancing. Isn't one glass of water the better option, given the other choices? We'd want the water even if it is the only choice. Quantity of choices is not the one thing that matters to freedom. Quality also matters. In fact, it may be more important. If you're thirsty, having five, or even a hundred toxic liquids doesn't make you free. You have no freedom to choose the only thing that will quench your thirst!

The person with only one option of water is infinitely more free than the other because he or she has the ability to choose what is good, which is to quench thirst. It is not just about a range of choices. It is about quality of choice. Freedom is not about having unlimited choices and to do what we want, i.e., autonomy that is only concerned about the individual self. It is about the ability to do what is morally right.

We are not completely autonomous, completely independent. Recognising our dependency on God, honouring God by using our resources, including our freedom, leads to a life of peace and justice, loving one's neighbour as oneself, caring for the common good as God's stewards. The ability to be free comes from doing what is good and right.

So, back to the protesters. We are living in a pandemic, something we haven't seen for 100 years. It's easily transmitted and it's dangerous. We don't have a cure, a vaccine. We have the option of limiting our movements and foregoing certain activities, to slow its spread. We keep safe by limiting contact with others, by wearing masks, avoiding crowds. This has limited our options at times – not going to concerts, the gym, restaurants, to church. Some say that makes us "not free."

Christians see things differently. We are called to be a people concerned for the common good of all which includes building a society of peace and justice where the vulnerable are protected and the sick taken care of. To best do that may mean staying home to save lives. We have that option to do good and what will best serve our neighbour. We are free in the proper understanding of the word. We may not have the most options, but we have the best options. That will mean inconvenience for many, for others, financial difficulty. People are hurting and want to return to normal. We want some control in our lives. Please remember it's not just about you. It's not just about your individual rights. As a society, a people of God, we must always consider how our acting affects others and do what is best for all. No-one has the right to be reckless and to harm others. Being a Christian doesn't always mean getting what I want when I want. It's not about what we want but what God wants. The essence of Christianity is freedom to sacrifice ourselves so that others may live.

A reading from Jonah Chapter 3 verse 10 to Chapter 4 verse 11

When God saw what they did, how they turned from their evil ways, God changed his mind about the calamity that he had said he would bring upon them; and he did not do it.

But this was very displeasing to Jonah, and he became angry. He prayed to the Lord and said, 'O Lord! Is not this what I said while I was still in my own country? That is why I fled to Tarshish at the beginning; for I knew that you are a gracious God and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love, and ready to relent from punishing. And now, O Lord, please take my life from me, for it is better for me to die than to live.' And the Lord said, 'Is it right for you to be angry?' Then Jonah went out of the city and sat down east of the city, and made a booth for himself there. He sat under it in the shade, waiting to see what would become of the city.

The LORD God appointed a bush, and made it come up over Jonah, to give shade over his head, to save him from his discomfort; so Jonah was very happy about the bush. But when dawn came up the next day, God appointed a worm that attacked the bush, so that it withered. When the sun rose, God prepared a sultry east wind, and the sun beat down on the head of Jonah so that he was faint and asked that he might die. He said, 'It is better for me to die than to live.'

But God said to Jonah, 'Is it right for you to be angry about the bush?' And he said, 'Yes, angry enough to die.' Then the Lord said, 'You are concerned about the bush, for which you did not labour and which you did not grow; it came into being in a night and perished in a night. And should I not be concerned about Nineveh, that great city, in which there are more than a hundred and twenty thousand people who do not know their right hand from their left, and also many animals?'

Since I am convinced of this, I know that I will remain and continue with all of you for your progress and joy in faith, so that I may share abundantly in your boasting in Christ Jesus when I come to you again.

Only, live your life in a manner worthy of the gospel of Christ, so that, whether I come and see you or am absent and hear about you, I will know that you are standing firm in one spirit, striving side by side with one mind for the faith of the gospel, and are in no way intimidated by your opponents. For them this is evidence of their destruction, but of your salvation. And this is God's doing. For he has graciously granted you the privilege not only of believing in Christ, but of suffering for him as well— since you are having the same struggle that you saw I had and now hear that I still have.

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew Chapter 20, verses 1-16

Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ

'For the kingdom of heaven is like a landowner who went out early in the morning to hire labourers for his vineyard. After agreeing with the labourers for the usual daily wage, he sent them into his vineyard. When he went out about nine o'clock, he saw others standing idle in the market-place; and he said to them, "You also go into the vineyard, and I will pay you whatever is right." So they went. When he went out again about noon and about three o'clock, he did the same. And about five o'clock he went out and found others standing around; and he said to them, "Why are you standing here idle all day?" They said to him, "Because no one has hired us." He said to them, "You also go into the vineyard." When evening came, the owner of the vineyard said to his manager, "Call the labourers and give them their pay, beginning with the last and then going to the first." When those hired about five o'clock came, each of them received the usual daily wage. Now when the first came, they thought they would receive more; but each of them also received the usual daily wage. And when they received it, they grumbled against the landowner, saying, "These last worked only one hour, and you have made them equal to us who have borne the burden of the day and the scorching heat." But he replied to one of them, "Friend, I am doing you no wrong; did you not agree with me for the usual daily wage? Take what belongs to you and go; I choose to give to this last the same as I give to you. Am I not allowed to do what I choose with what belongs to me? Or are you envious because I am generous?" So the last will be first, and the first will be last.'
