

SAINTS

Today we celebrate Saint Luke, evangelist and martyr. Why honour the saints? We do so not to give glory to them, but to Jesus Christ. Saints are those who have been faithful in their following of Christ. Some in the Church are uncomfortable about giving any role to saints for fear of diverting attention away from Our Lord. The saints are not honoured for any inherent goodness they might have, but because they remained faithful to Jesus. St Paul said to the church in Corinth, "Be imitators of me, as I am of Christ" (1 Cor. 11:1).

The saints encourage us by their faithfulness in ordinary, not necessarily heroic ways. Every Sunday we confess the faith of the Church in the Nicene Creed. We say we believe in the "communion of saint." That includes all God's "holy ones" In heaven and earth. The saints are the great cloud of witnesses cheering us on from the bleachers and encouraging us to remain faithful the way they did in their day. What's important for us today is how we live in following the saints who followed Christ. I love that line in the hymn *For all the saints* that says, "We feebly struggle, they in glory shine." They've run their race; we're still on the journey.

Today, there is a sort of puritanical ideal in many churches, a way of looking at things as clear cut, black and white. It may be convenient to divide the world and the church into saints and sinners, goodies and baddies, successes and failures and it may give us a sense of control because we know who's in and who's out, who's naughty and who's nice but it's also false and unreal and it's *unchristian*. Oscar Wilde said, "every saint has a past and every sinner has a future." He also said in his sublime poem, Ballad of Reading Gaol:

Ah! Happy they whose hearts can break

And peace of pardon win!

How else may man make straight his plan

And cleanse his soul from sin?

How else but through a broken heart

May Lord Christ enter in?

Being a saint doesn't mean being perfect and flawless. Many saints were quite flawed people. Jesus was the only perfect human being, but his followers are flawed make no mistake, even the best of them.

Luke, whom we celebrate today, was not flawless. God takes the broken pieces of our lives and makes us whole people. We place ourselves in the light by spending time with God in prayer and contemplation, by receiving the sacraments, by studying the scriptures, by opening ourselves to his loving gaze. Light really doesn't really do much other than shine. And it helps us see better. The question for us is, do our lives help others to see better?

Do your best to come to me soon, for Demas, in love with this present world, has deserted me and gone to Thessalonica; Crescens has gone to Galatia, Titus to Dalmatia. Only Luke is with me. Get Mark and bring him with you, for he is useful in my ministry. I have sent Tychicus to Ephesus. When you come, bring the cloak that I left with Carpus at Troas, also the books, and above all the parchments. Alexander the coppersmith did me great harm; the Lord will pay him back for his deeds. You also must beware of him, for he strongly opposed our message.

At my first defence no one came to my support, but all deserted me. May it not be counted against them! But the Lord stood by me and gave me strength, so that through me the message might be fully proclaimed and all the Gentiles might hear it.

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke
Chapter 10, verses 1-9

Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ

After this the Lord appointed seventy others and sent them on ahead of him in pairs to every town and place where he himself intended to go. He said to them, 'The harvest is plentiful, but the labourers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out labourers into his harvest. Go on your way. See, I am sending you out like lambs into the midst of wolves. Carry no purse, no bag, no sandals; and greet no one on the road. Whatever house you enter, first say, "Peace to this house!" And if anyone is there who shares in peace, your peace will rest on that person; but if not, it will return to you. Remain in the same house, eating and drinking whatever they provide, for the labourer deserves to be paid. Do not move about from house to house. Whenever you enter a town and its people welcome you, eat what is set before you; cure the sick who are there, and say to them, "The kingdom of God has come near to you."

St Luke, Evangelist and Martyr - Sunday 18 October 2020

Jeremiah 8.22 – 9.3; Psalm 145.10-18;
2 Timothy 4.9-17a; Luke 10.1-9

Why do we celebrate the saints? Because they encourage us in our closer following of the Lord Jesus. Luke is traditionally thought of as a physician. He focuses more than other Gospel writers on Jesus' ministry with women, and His ministry of healing.

Luke is mentioned in other parts of the New Testament, in the rather plaintive Epistle reading for today, and other letters of Paul, as well as in his second book - Acts - where at several stages the narrative changes from *they* to *we*.

Clearly Luke was at the forefront in the early spread of the Gospel and is the perhaps the only Gentile to write in the New Testament.
