Fr Roy writes: I have been thinking recently of the Church generally over the centuries with all the ups and downs within its life. I am not thinking of denominations, as we have such a multiplicity of them now, but of the universal church that we speak of as the Body of Christ. When I look at church history, I find times of great expansion such as the time immediately after the coming of the Holy Spirit to the first apostles, the great missionary journeys of Paul and his companions, the great saints of later centuries whose lives, spirituality and teaching changed the lives of people to follow Jesus and his commandments to love, etc. On the other hand, there have been many times that evil has taken over the Church and its people. This is not only sin of individual Christians, but sin of the Church at large that has not known how to cope with and correct the behaviour of sexual and physical assault upon children and other people.

This brings me to the result of our sin on our life and the lives. Our sin takes us away from God and of those around us. No longer does God play a central part in our life. That sin has taken over, especially if it is repeated time after time without any repentance on our part. The same applies to the Church if there is no repentance.

Part of Jesus' message is "Repent for the Kingdom of God is at hand." This means a turnaround in life, with spending time to determine our sins, to ask for absolution and to endeavour to not do it again. Jesus came to save us from the result of our sins. This is the situation throughout life, our life, and the life of the Church. We, along with the Church, must be a penitent body of people who are known by our sorrow and absolution for the past and love and compassion shown in the present and the future.

This brings me to another area that is dear to my heart, that is, sharing or gossiping the Gospel. I trust that you continue to pray for a few people you know that they may come to know God and our Lord Jesus Christ and to follow him in life and worship. The gossiping of the Gospel applies to anyone with whom you are holding a conversation in which life comes up. This provides an opportunity to ask a question like "How do you

see God as impacting on your life?" and with the guidance of the Holy Spirit you listen to what is said and take the conversation from there. It may be a full stop, or it may open for something from your own experience. This could lead to an invitation to attend worship with you on the following Sunday and a short explanation of what to expect. The Holy Spirit came to our parish, our Church, our congregations and to you and me a couple of weeks ago on Pentecost Sunday to repent, to receive and show forgiveness and to gossip the Gospel among our friends and acquaintances who are called by God to embrace the Faith of Jesus who is the Way, the Truth, and the Life.

Keep well, keep safe, keep social distancing, and the blessing of God be upon you and on all who you love and pray for and may your days and nights be holy, good, and peaceful. AMEN.

A Reading from Galatians Chapter 5, verses 1, 13-25

For freedom Christ has set us free. Stand firm, therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery.

For you were called to freedom, brothers and sisters; only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for self-indulgence, but through love become slaves to one another. For the whole law is summed up in a single commandment, 'You shall love your neighbour as yourself.' If, however, you bite and devour one another, take care that you are not consumed by one another.

Live by the Spirit, I say, and do not gratify the desires of the flesh. For what the flesh desires is opposed to the Spirit, and what the Spirit desires is opposed to the flesh; for these are opposed to each other, to prevent you from doing what you want. But if you are led by the Spirit, you are not subject to the law. Now the works of the flesh are obvious: fornication, impurity, licentiousness, idolatry, sorcery, enmities, strife, jealousy, anger, quarrels, dissensions, factions, envy, drunkenness, carousing, and things like these. I am warning you, as I warned you before: those who do such things will not inherit the kingdom of God.

By contrast, the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against such things. And those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. If we live by the Spirit, let us also be guided by the Spirit.

RECEPTION OF HOLY COMMUNION

We fully participate in the celebration of the Eucharist when we receive Holy Communion. We are encouraged to receive Communion regularly and with deep devotion. This is why as Anglicans we follow Catholic tradition and the heritage of the 1662 Book of Common Prayer which includes a General Confession and Absolution or, if any feel the need due to some sin weighing on his or her mind, an invitation, as in the Exhortation, to go to the priest to make private confession and receive absolution.

Going forward to the altar to receive Communion is not a queue like being at the supermarket, it's a procession. Whenever the Church, the Body of Christ, is in procession, it is a sign that we as the pilgrim people of God are on our way to the heavenly Jerusalem. We are moving forward to the time when we will be "called home", taken by death from this world to enter into the joy of our Lord and Saviour, into the Kingdom he has prepared for us. When we move forward in procession to receive the Body and Blood of Christ, we are a sign and symbol of the Church, the People of God "on the way."

We do all this at the invitation of Christ. The priest, acting on behalf of Christ, extends that invitation in the words, "Happy are those who are called to the supper of the Lamb." We process forward, joining the great "cloud of witnesses" who have gone before us. We are part of the community of the baptised, not just solitary individuals engaged in an act of private devotion and piety. Through our baptism we are joined to one another and to Christ. As St Paul says, "The cup of blessing that we bless, is it not a sharing (communion, fellowship, participation) in the blood of Christ? The bread that we break, is it not a sharing (communion, fellowship, participation) in the body of Christ? Because there is one bread, we who are many are one body, for we all partake of the one bread" (1 Cor. 10:16, 17).

It is important that we are mindful of our brothers and sisters in Christ. After receiving the Host, remember that there is someone behind you. Instead of waiting, please move immediately to the line in front of the person administering the chalice and stand behind the person in front of you until it's

your turn. The Prayer Book instructs us to say "Amen" after the words of administering the Body and Blood of Christ. This an expression of our joy and faith in receiving Christ into our hearts and lives.

• 2 Kings 2.1-2, 6-14; Psalm 77.1-2 11-20; Galatians 5.1, 13 -25; Luke 9.51 -62

In his letter to the Galatians, St Paul lists the fruit of the Holy Spirit: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self -control. He contrasts them with the 'works of the flesh' – which will lead us to lose our place as an inheritor of the kingdom of God. By working to bring the fruit of the Spirit to the forefront in our lives, we bring ourselves closer to being numbered among the citizens of God's kingdom.
