DID YOU HEAR ...?

How often has a conversation begun, "Did you hear about so-and so?" "No. Tell me." Dr Richard Carlson, in a delightful little book, *Don't Sweat the Small Stuff with Your Family*, writes, "When you talk behind someone's back, it says far less about the person you are discussing than it does about your own character, about your need to be critical and your need to talk behind other people's backs. It's like hitting a person who is down- the person you are talking about is not able to defend himself or herself. It's not fair."

Why talk about gossip? For one thing it seems to be something of an epidemic in our society. There's been for a while now a whole range of publications that are nicknamed *gossip magazines*. The advent of so-called 'reality TV' gave us a voyeuristic peek into strange people doing weird things. Trials and tribulations of the rich and famous, or scandal involving public figures like politicians and entertainers, provide us with a delicious feast of 'news' items that fill the airwaves and printed media. The internet has taken this to a new and nasty level. In August 2016, TIME magazine had a cover story called, "Why we're losing the Internet to the culture of hate." Sam Altman, who ran Reddit for eight days after a PR crisis, says in the article, "Now everyone on the Internet is a public figure. The problem is that not everyone can deal with that." He later quit Twitter (he had 171,000 followers) saying "I feel worse after using Twitter . . . my brain gets polluted here." Like air pollution, the effects are not noticed until the damage has been done.

Gossip makes us feel powerful because we place ourselves in the position of judge and jury without the person being present to defend himself or herself. This is why we have proper processes for dealing with criminal behaviour through the courts instead of a free-for-all approach involving mob violence. A form of 'lynching' takes place when someone is judged and sentenced by hearsay and gossip. What starts out as 'innocent' conversation or online posts ends up being an exercise in mob psychology and gross injustice.

The Bible has a bit to say about this destructive form of behaviour. "A gossip goes about telling secrets, but one who is

trustworthy in spirit keeps a confidence" (Prov. 11:13). "A perverse person spreads strife, and a whisperer separates close friends" (Prov. 16:28). "Without wood a fire goes out; without gossip a quarrel dies down" (Prov. 26:20). "The words of a whisperer are like delicious morsels; they go down into the inner parts of the body" (Prov. 26:22). Gossip has a cancerous effect on us. St Paul, writing to the church in Corinth, says, "I fear that when I come, I may find you not as I wish, and that you may not find me as you wish; I fear that there may perhaps be quarreling, jealousy, anger, selfishness, slander, gossip, conceit, and disorder" (2 Cor. 12:20).

When Jesus was on trial before Pilate, he was slandered with false accusations. He kept silent. Next time someone comes to you with a 'delicious morsel' of info about another person, or you read it somewhere, gently refuse to get involved. Perhaps turn the conversation in another direction or say something positive or just remain silent. Give it a go and see how much better you feel inside.

Do not be deceived; God is not mocked, for you reap whatever you sow. If you sow to your own flesh, you will reap corruption from the flesh; but if you sow to the Spirit, you will reap eternal life from the Spirit. So let us not grow weary in doing what is right, for we will reap at harvest time, if we do not give up. So then, whenever we have an opportunity, let us work for the good of all, and especially for those of the family of faith.

See what large letters I make when I am writing in my own hand! It is those who want to make a good showing in the flesh that try to compel you to be circumcised—only that they may not be persecuted for the cross of Christ. Even the circumcised do not themselves obey the law, but they want you to be circumcised so that they may boast about your flesh. May I never boast of anything except the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by which the world has been crucified to me, and I to the world. For neither circumcision nor uncircumcision is anything; but a new creation is everything! As for those who will follow this rule—peace be upon them, and mercy, and upon the Israel of God.

From now on, let no one make trouble for me; for I carry the marks of Jesus branded on my body.

May the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with your spirit, brothers and sisters. Amen.

RECEPTION OF HOLY COMMUNION

We fully participate in the celebration of the Eucharist when we receive Holy Communion. We are encouraged to receive Communion regularly and with deep devotion. This is why as Anglicans we follow Catholic tradition and the heritage of the 1662 Book of Common Prayer which includes a General Confession and Absolution or, if any feel the need due to some sin weighing on his or her mind, an invitation, as in the Exhortation, to go to the priest to make private confession and receive absolution.

Going forward to the altar to receive Communion is not a queue like being at the supermarket, it's a procession. Whenever the Church, the Body of Christ, is in procession, it is a sign that we as the pilgrim people of God are on our way to the heavenly Jerusalem. We are moving forward to the time when we will be "called home", taken by death from this world to enter into the joy of our Lord and Saviour, into the Kingdom he has prepared for us. When we move forward in procession to receive the Body and Blood of Christ, we are a sign and symbol of the Church, the People of God "on the way."

We do all this at the invitation of Christ. The priest, acting on behalf of Christ, extends that invitation in the words, "Happy are those who are called to the supper of the Lamb." We process forward, joining the great "cloud of witnesses" who have gone before us. We are part of the community of the baptised, not just solitary individuals engaged in an act of private devotion

and piety. Through our baptism we are joined to one another and to Christ. As St Paul says, "The cup of blessing that we bless, is it not a sharing (communion, fellowship, participation) in the blood of Christ? The bread that we break, is it not a sharing (communion, fellowship, participation) in the body of Christ? Because there is one bread, we who are many are one body, for we all partake of the one bread" (1 Cor. 10:16, 17).

It is important that we are mindful of our brothers and sisters in Christ. After receiving the Host, remember that there is someone behind you. Instead of waiting, please move immediately to the line in front of the person administering the chalice and stand behind the person in front of you until it's your turn. The Prayer Book instructs us to say "Amen" after the words of administering the Body and Blood of Christ. This an expression of our joy and faith in receiving Christ into our hearts and lives.

Being a community: • We will value the wellbeing and safety of others, especially children and other vulnerable people. • We will encourage each other to participate in the life of the church. • We will consider the impact of our behaviour on others.

Relating to each other: • We will protect the safety of all, especially children and other vulnerable people. • We will treat each other with respect and dignity, irrespective of ability, gender, sexuality, race, age or contribution to the church. • We will act with integrity and honesty in our interactions with each other.

Communicating with each other: • We will communicate respectfully with others, and not in a way that threatens, belittles or humiliates. • We will speak with integrity and honesty, and refrain from speculation and gossip.

Acknowledging difference: • We will respect those who are different from us and not isolate or ridicule them. • We will listen to and seek to understand the beliefs, opinions and practices of others, even when we do not share their views.

Responding to conflict: • We will accept responsibility for our part in a conflict. • We will be willing to play our part in resolving a conflict.
