"Parish Councillors are aware that Margaret and I, as from **Tuesday 28th May**, shall be commencing an extended period of leave (12 weeks long service leave and the balance being overdue recreational leave). I formally return to parish duties on **Tuesday 17th September**. I am very grateful to Reverend Ann Watson (appointed locum tenens) for her preparedness to serve the parish in my absence and to Father Roy Hazlewood and Reverend Richard Harvey for their support of Reverend Ann and their continuing service to the parish.

I shall be in the parish to conduct the marriage of Michelle Dodd and Grant Pericleos on **Saturday**, **17**th **August** before Margaret and I travel to Devonport to visit family.

Regarding Diocesan matters, it is certain at this stage that a Special Synod will meet on **Saturday 25th May**. This Synod is charged with the responsibility of amending the **Diocesan Clerical Ministry Ordinance** so to facilitate more effective processes for electing a Bishop. Once an amended Ordinance is in place the present Diocesan Administrator will then be able to convene an Electoral Synod, given that the present Ordinance requires a ninety day lead time for calling, nominating and preparing for an election. It may be that the next Electoral Synod may be as early as **13th / 14th / 15th September**, in which event I shall have to return to duty early.

Parish Consultation - Saturday, 4th May

Parishioners were called to a Parish Consultation which was held on **Saturday, 4th May from 9.00am to 4.00pm**. It was earnestly hoped that this time together as a faith community would be an opportunity for our parish jointly to share a process which would eventually generate a statement of identity and vision leading to goals and strategic planning.

Such a process, **the process itself being an essential element**, ordinarily should facilitate a body of knowledge, clarity of thought, shared decisions and ownership of deep seated big ideas which both seed and test decision-making at all levels.

Fr Roy, serving as chaplain for the day, began our time together with prayer and called us to prayer throughout the day. We then spent a significant amount of time reading and reflecting upon relevant Holy Scripture and seeking guidance and inspiration as we entered into a process of naming our identity, vision and goals.

Thus centred, we then considered how we would respond if someone asked us who we are as a parish and what we did. What is our reason for being? How do we live who we truly are, day by day, as individuals and community? Obviously these deliberations go to our awareness of who we are and how deliberately and subconsciously we ought to live according to our identity.

It follows too that our lived identity defines and energises our focuses and what we do about them. Having mused with big ideas the participants of our Parish Consultation were asked to share some of the highlights of our existing parish profile and experiences.

Then all were asked to share ideas which may help us to name our identity and attributes of such an identity. **How would we like others to know and experience us?**

The ideas generated in this 'brainstorming' were recorded without omission, variation or judgement. After a break all were asked to place a tick against those ideas (typically around three each) which we should further consider in greater depth and which should not be lost as the process continues to emerge. (e) A centre where common interest groups are available to anyone who wishes to join and thereby enabling newcomers to feel that they belong. For many people who are outside the church culture, who know nothing of church tradition and very little about the Scriptures or worship the feeling of belonging is important in this age of individualism. This is an age where we have the freedom to go our own way and yet there is an innate desire to belong to one another. In many cases this feeling of belonging leads to faith and faith development. Faith is developed to the point where the person believes in the presence of Jesus in the heart and not just things about Jesus.

(f) A centre for hospitality that means loving strangers. "Hospice" means "a safe place". Hospitality, then, means providing a safe place for strangers to experience kindness, acceptance and love. We can read about Jesus' command to love one another but the only way to learn about love is to love. To love in Jesus' way requires commitment. A centre for hospitality provides the opportunity to fulfil that commitment and to learn to love the stranger in our midst

Creating community

(1) It is wise to remember that creating a church community that covers the bases (a) to (f) above will not be easy. In fact, it is a continuing process that is never completed because of the changing nature of the church community. There are several reasons for this difficulty to create community. They include:

The difficulty of giving up control. Where there is such a diversity of groups as outlined above along with cultural and social diversity differences can arise that can only be resolved by listening to one another, taking all sides seriously, reaching an agreement and abiding by it.

The fact that leadership is challenged. This means giving up power. Handing over leadership in each of the above "centres (a) to (f)" enables people to do ministry and not just to receive it. / to be continued

Some Material Shared at the Recent Parish Consultation ...an extract from Fr Roy's musing.

Creating Community

"Christian communities continue the work of Jesus. They are sent to be a presence to people who are living in darkness and despair. The people who come into these communities also respond to the call and the cry of the weak and the oppressed. They enter into the covenant with Jesus and the poor. They meet Jesus in them" Jean Vanier

Goals for the community

There are a number of goals that a congregation keeps firmly in mind as it goes about its life. It must be:

(a) A centre for prayer and spirituality, where people are taught to pray and to deal with life spiritually. In order for this to happen, the basis from which the parish clergy work in ministry is to lead a life of prayer themselves and to lead the congregation in a life of prayer. In order for the members of the community to be taught to deal with life spiritually, the individual leaders need to wrestle with spiritual matters in their own lives in order to bring something to the group. People need to know and feel that God is real and that they live in the presence of God

(b) A centre for education and teaching showing a concern for life issues such as parenting, keeping a job, maintaining relationships in the work place and with partner, family and friends and dealing with ageing parents.

(c) A community of faith that has a real, living relationship with God in Christ. It is, also, a centre for faith development with opportunities for further teaching on theological and biblical issues through small group discussion, lectures and sermons based on the Scriptures.

(d) A centre for ministry and outreach into the secular community (the world of education, work and leisure).

Apart from worksheets, participants were given some key resources for ongoing consideration. First was the collection of **Scriptural extracts**. Also distributed was a paper written by Fr Roy entitled **"Towards a parish mission statement"**; a collection of **extracts from various authoritative sources**; and a collection of **various documents and statements which have appeared in the pew bulletin** over the last couple years. The hope is that this process has placed Scriptural warrant and the discipline of prayer at heart of our deliberations; has opened a conversation towards an open and honest situation analysis and understanding of our aspirations; has commenced an intentional immersion in the insights, concepts and examples of experienced others; and has recommended a categorical language to shape our responses, viz., **identity**, **vision**, **goals**, and subsequent, ongoing **strategic planning**.

Where to from here? Perhaps the next three months may be an ideal opportunity for individuals and groups prayerfully to immerse themselves in **Scriptural studies** and the **relevant ideas and examples** which are available.

I pray that an openness to such broadly based input will begin to **illuminate and enflesh the categories** with which we are working.

Trinity Band

During this year I have been dialoguing with our faithful, loyal and inspiring Trinity Band to progress our management structures and to facilitate the development of our musicality and musical repertoire.

Subsequently Jeff Thompson has agreed to serve as Conductor. Mike Gosling has agreed to deputise. John Holt has accepted the position of Bursar and Max White will deputise.

With all parishioners I am thankful for the enduring gift of musical leadership which Trinity Band and Singers offer so faithfully.

Trinity Teens

Our Trinity Teens continue to meet very faithfully during term time. However there has been no growth and the existence of the group has not of itself engendered wider support within the parish. Externally we continue to exist in very crowded and aggressively competitive 'marketplace'.

The group has evaluated the experiences of last year and especially our experimental services. The hospitality and encouragement of many was appreciated. Notwithstanding the following observations are noteworthy –

- **1.** The development and implementation of each service was very resource intensive and thus not easily replicated.
- **2.** Developing the style would continue to compromise the nature of the 9.30am gathering.
- 3. It may well be profitable to consider exploring another time in which experimentation can occur in a relatively unrestricted environment.
- 4. The Teens want to explore forums other than worship and their own fellowship whereby other teens can be invited along to begin forming a non-threatening, enduring and wholesome Christian relationship.

During my leave The Reverend Ann has agreed to supervise Trinity Teens. The Teens are developing a list of activities to explore and which may be a prototype for 'missionary' work. The list includes...

- Games nights at Holy Trinity
- Outdoor sports on Sunday afternoon
- Night Tennis
- Cooking classes at Trinity (cup cakes, pizzas et al)
- Theme nights with games and dancing
- Barefoot Bowls
- DVD nights

Utility space

I have flagged informally that I believe we should consider, as soon as possible, removing the shed collection and replacing it with a basket-ball sized multi-purpose building, with work rooms and storage space. This would provide ministry space for Youth Ministry, Market Days, outdoor gatherings, men's group space...and so on. If we think outside the square and develop a further ministry space which physically connects with our existing facility then that may modify the issues related to a possible Rectory development or at the very least sewerage arrangements and parking. Funding this possibility may be possible as we consider reserves and income.

Messy Church

Unquestionably Messy Church is a great blessing to our parish and a potential source of vitality and growth. Last Sunday the team assembled a wonderful array of activities which thoroughly engaged the young ones. The 'Messy Baptism' also engaged the children, and the young candidates (aged 9,7, & 5) entered into the sacrament very seriously.

Congratulations to our very inspired and inspiring, hard working Messy Church team. They are enduring and wrestling with the critical matter of holding the interest of newcomers until there is deep commitment. **Help is needed with prayer, additional personnel to support visiting and, as with Trinity Teens, a broad embrace by many parishioners to help with encouraging participation and follow-up. This is a core task!**
