Reading from the book of Genesis Chapter 12: Verses 1 - 4a.

Now the LORD said to Abram, 'Go from your country and your kindred and your father's house to the land that I will show you. I will make of you a great nation, and I will bless you, and make your name great, so that you will be a blessing. I will bless those who bless you, and the one who curses you I will curse; and in you all the families of the earth shall be blessed.'

Psalm: 121.

I lift up my eyes to the hills: but where shall I find help? My help comes from the Lord: who has made heaven and earth.

He will not suffer your foot to stumble: and he who watches over you will not sleep. Be sure he who has charge of Israel: will neither slumber nor sleep.

The Lord himself is your keeper: the Lord is your defence upon your right hand; The sun shall not strike you by day: nor shall the moon by night.

The Lord will defend you from all evil: it is he who will guard your life. The Lord will defend your going out and your coming in: from this time forward for evermore.

A Reading from the letter of Paul to the Romans, Chapter 4. 1 – 5, 13-17.

What then are we to say was gained by Abraham, our ancestor according to the flesh? For if Abraham was justified by works, he has something to boast about, but not before God. For what does the scripture say? 'Abraham believed God, and it was reckoned to him as righteousness.' Now to one who works, wages are not reckoned as a gift but as something due. But to one who without works trusts him who justifies the ungodly, such faith is reckoned as righteousness.

For the promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation.

For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, as it is written, 'I have made you the father of many nations')—in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist.

according to St. Matthew, Chapter 17, verses 1-9

Six days later, Jesus took with him Peter and James and his brother John and led them up a high mountain, by themselves. And he was transfigured before them, and his face shone like the sun, and his clothes became dazzling white. Suddenly there appeared to them Moses and Elijah, talking with him. Then Peter said to Jesus, 'Lord, it is good for us to be here; if you wish, I will make three dwellings here, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah.' While he was still speaking, suddenly a bright cloud overshadowed them, and from the cloud a voice said, 'This is my Son, the Beloved; with him I am well pleased; listen to him!' When the disciples heard this, they fell to the ground and were overcome by fear. But Jesus came and touched them, saying, 'Get up and do not be afraid.' And when they looked up, they saw no one except Jesus himself alone.

As they were coming down the mountain, Jesus ordered them, 'Tell no one about the vision until after the Son of Man has been raised from the dead.'

Last Sunday Pope Francis attended a service at All Saints' Anglican Church in Rome. The visit marked the 200th anniversary of the All Saints' church. The Pope said, "As Catholics and Anglicans, we are humbly grateful that, after centuries of mutual mistrust, we are now able to recognize that the fruitful grace of Christ is at work also in others," the pope said in his sermon. "Today we can be encouraged by our gathering."

Last October he attended a special service in Rome with Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, to mark the 50th anniversary of the historic meeting between then Archbishop Michael Ramsey and Pope Paul VI.

With so much news of division and conflict, we can take hope and encouragement for the breaking down of old barriers and growth in mutual respect and understanding.

It is a way of allowing God to transform our lives through the Scriptures looking into the very depth of the heart as well as the mind.

LENT – THE LIGHT ENABLES US TO SEE CLEARLY

When people I know have had cataracts removed they marvel at the clarity with which they can see things. Often they can throw away their spectacles. What was blurred and indistinct is now sharp and clear. When Peter, James and John went with Jesus up the Mount of Transfiguration they saw Jesus clearly for the first time. Matthew tells us Jesus took them there "by themselves" (Matt 17:1). They could only see Jesus clearly when they were away, far removed from the noise, the crowds, the hostile religious and political establishment that tried to downplay and downgrade the impact and significance of Jesus. Detached from all those distractions and activities, they finally saw Jesus as he really was and what he was all about.

For one thing he was greater than Moses and Elijah, heroes of the faith of Israel. His shining face and brilliant white garments and the voice from heaven spoke to them of his glory and his unique relationship to the Father. They saw and understood Jesus differently from the way they had seen and understood him until now.

Lent is an opportunity for us to strengthen the spiritual life by eradicating those distractions and diversions which dull our vision and prevent us seeing clearly and consequently which also cause the light to become dim for us. It is a time for us to see Jesus clearly again or perhaps for the first time. When the Light of Christ shines on us and in us we see those things we need to change. Benedictine Sister Joan Chittister says, "Once that happens, life is no longer about adding up the things we get or do not get in order to check our score against the economic scores of those around us. It is not about what arguments we win or do not win. Then, life is not even about what we understand or do not understand. It is about finding the Light of our lives and then taking it back down the dark mountains of our years to where Jesus will now go on being refracted for us through all the elements of all our days. And if we do it seriously, sincerely, there will come a time when that Light is refracted through us to others, as well. Once that happens, none of us will ever really be in the dark again" ('Dawning of the Light' *The Tablet* 28 February 2015 p. 13).

HOW TO MAKE ROOM FOR LIFE'S BIGGEST QUESTIONS

"The 17th-century French philosopher Blaise Pascal said that most of us spend our lives seeking diversions in a desperate attempt to avoid the hard and simple questions: who am I? What is the purpose of my life? What does God want of me?

We eat and drink, gamble and gossip, seek out the most banal entertainments, surrender to television and social media, attend party after party—all in order to avoid those questions.

Right now, identify the diversion that most distracts you from these questions. Then take some practical steps to rid yourself of it, or at least reduce it.

Are you preoccupied with eating and drinking? Then fast regularly. Do you watch too much television or spend too much time on Facebook? Then give yourself a specific limit. Do you indulge in idle chatter? Then resolve not to say anything mean about anybody (you'll find that your conversations are a lot shorter.) Do you socialize too much? Then refrain from non-essential parties for the rest of Lent.

Clear the ground. Clean out the system. Make room for yourself to ask and reflect on life's most important questions.

To follow Jesus into the desert is to divest yourself of diversions. It to sacrifice the superficial so that the depth may arise. It is to still the chatter so that God's voice might be heard."
