God of power and love,

who raised your Son Jesus from death to life, resplendent in glory to rule over all creation: free the world to rejoice in his peace, to glory in his justice, and to live in his love. Unite the human race in Jesus Christ your Son, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen.**

A reading from the book of Ezekiel Chapter 34: verses 11-16, 20-24.

For thus says the Lord GOD: I myself will search for my sheep, and will seek them out. As shepherds seek out their flocks when they are among their scattered sheep, so I will seek out my sheep. I will rescue them from all the places to which they have been scattered on a day of clouds and thick darkness. I will bring them out from the peoples and gather them from the countries, and will bring them into their own land; and I will feed them on the mountains of Israel, by the watercourses, and in all the inhabited parts of the land. I will feed them with good pasture, and the mountain heights of Israel shall be their pasture; there they shall lie down in good grazing land, and they shall feed on rich pasture on the mountains of Israel. I myself will be the shepherd of my sheep, and I will make them lie down, says the Lord GOD. I will seek the lost, and I will bring back the strayed, and I will bind up the injured, and I will strengthen the weak, but the fat and the strong I will destroy. I will feed them with justice.

Therefore, thus says the Lord GOD to them: I myself will judge between the fat sheep and the lean sheep. Because you pushed with flank and shoulder, and butted at all the weak animals with your horns until you scattered them far and wide, I will save my flock, and they shall no longer be ravaged; and I will judge between sheep and sheep.

I will set up over them one shepherd, my servant David, and he shall feed them: he shall feed them and be their shepherd. And I, the LORD, will be their God, and my servant David shall be prince among them; I, the LORD, have spoken.

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew 25: verses 31–46.

'When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, then he will sit on the throne of his glory. All the nations will be gathered before him, and he will separate people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats, and he will put the sheep at his right hand and the goats at the left. Then the king will say to those at his right hand, "Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me." Then the righteous will answer him, "Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and gave you food, or thirsty and gave you something to drink? And when was it that we saw you a stranger and welcomed you, or naked and gave you clothing? And when was it that we saw you sick or in prison and visited you?" And the king will answer them, "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me." Then he will say to those at his left hand, "You that are accursed, depart from me into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels; for I was hungry and you gave me no food,

I was thirsty and you gave me nothing to drink, I was a stranger and you did not welcome me, naked and you did not give me clothing, sick and in prison and you did not visit me." Then they also will answer, "Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or sick or in prison, and did not take care of you?" Then he will answer them, "Truly I tell you, just as you did not do it to one of the least of these, you did not do it to me." And these will go away into eternal punishment, but the righteous into eternal life.'

SILENCE IN THE PRESENCE OF THE KING

Today we celebrate the last Sunday in the liturgical year – the Feast of Christ the King. This festival is a good opportunity to reflect on what it means to be members of the kingdom of God and how the kingship of Christ is manifested in our daily living. It's good also to reflect on how lesser kingdoms like consumerism, individualism, materialism etc., control our lives. Worship is meant to reorient our lives towards God's Kingdom and away from these lesser kingdoms. When we enter the church, we begin a process that is designed to refocus us on God and what God requires of us.

We each bring numerous distractions and preoccupations which work against this reorientation of our lives towards God. Worship rightly orders our lives. Worship is not just words; it includes actions and periods of silence. A word that isn't commonly used today is 'numinous' which means awe in the presence of the divine. The Latin *numen* means "divine will" or "nod". So physical actions like bowing the head, bowing to the altar, listening attentively to the words of the liturgy and the readings and the homily are mean of assenting or "nodding" to God's will as he rightly orders our lives.

At the Eucharist there are times of silence. The rubrics (instructions for the conduct of the services) in our Prayer Book include the following at the end of the

Communion Service: "Silence is important in this rite. It may be observed as follows: before the collect, after any of the readings and/or the sermon, before the confession, after the distribution of the holy communion" (A Prayer Book for Australia, p.164).

We live in a world of noise and rush. God speaks in the silence. Time and space for silence are essential in our Christian journey and our growth in the love of God. In the world we can scarcely go a moment without noise. Shopping centres have music playing, many lifts have background music, and many people have to have the radio or television on all the time. Many are uncomfortable with silence. Others welcome it.

Silence in the liturgy gives us pause to reflect on what we have just heard or prepare us for what comes next. Before the General Confession we are given the opportunity to reflect on our own sins before we join together in confessing our sins corporately. Silence is important after the readings to allow the word of God to penetrate our hearts. This requires the reader to pause *before* saying "Hear the word of the Lord." Silence after the sermon enables us to reflect on the words we have just heard and apply them to our own lives. And remaining in silent prayer after receiving the Sacrament gives us time to reflect on the great love of Jesus in his sacrifice and to give thanks in our hearts.

Silence also helps us to avoid distraction. Bowing the head, kneeling, and closing the eyes are ways that many find helpful in observing silence. Others find it helpful to just sit quietly. It is not the time to look around or stare at the priest waiting for the next instruction, and certainly not the time to engage in idle chitchat.

Another rubric in our Prayer Book says that, after receiving the Sacrament the communicant responds *Amen*. Whenever we are given something, especially a

gift of any kind, some form of acknowledgement is not only good manners, it shows our gratitude to the giver. Saying *Amen* when we receive communion is an affirmation of faith and an acknowledgement that we are gratefully receiving the Body and Blood of Christ.

Of course, reorienting our lives toward God doesn't end when we leave the church building. As our Gospel today reminds us, we continue to seek God's will in our daily lives as we become more sensitive to the poor, the sick, the hungry, the refugee, the prisoner, and the marginalised in our society and our world. Care for these "little ones" demonstrates our loyalty to Christ as King.

As we acknowledge Jesus as our King, let us enter his presence with awe and thanksgiving and allow him to re-order our lives toward his divine purpose.
