A reading from the book of Exodus
Chapter 20: verses 1-17.

Then God spoke all these words:

I am the LORD your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery; you shall have no other gods before me.

You shall not make for yourself an idol, whether in the form of anything that is in heaven above, or that is on the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth. You shall not bow down to them or worship them; for I the LORD your God am a jealous God, punishing children for the iniquity of parents, to the third and the fourth generation of those who reject me, but showing steadfast love to the thousandth generation of those who love me and keep my commandments.

You shall not make wrongful use of the name of the LORD your God, for the LORD will not acquit anyone who misuses his name.

Remember the sabbath day, and keep it holy. For six days you shall labour and do all your work. But the seventh day is a sabbath to the LORD your God; you shall not do any work—you, your son or your daughter, your male or female slave, your livestock, or the alien resident in your towns. **A reading from the first letter of Paul to the Corinthians,

For the message about the cross is foolishness to those who
are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of

**The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ
according to John, chapter 2: verses 13-22.**

LENTEN LITURGICAL PRACTICES

Lent is not primarily a re-enactment of Jesus' 40-day fast in the wilderness, although that is a secondary emphasis. Rather, Lent has its origins in the period of preparation of candidates for baptism at Easter. Later, those who had been excommunicated for serious and public sin underwent a rigorous penance leading to their readmission to communion at Easter. In time, the Church realised the benefit of *all* Christians going through a period of prayer, fasting, penitence, and almsgiving.

'Giving up' certain things in Lent is expressed liturgically by a greater simplicity in worship. This helps our focus on penitence and provides a stark contrast to the joyfulness of the Easter celebration. We omit the singing of the *Gloria in excelsis* and the *Alleluia* at the Eucharist; later in Lent, on the Fifth Sunday, we veil the icons and processional cross and remove some of the decorations from the church to divert our eyes and hearts inwards for reflection; we remove the paschal candle; we sing more reflective hymns, avoiding the word 'Alleluia'; we use violet hangings and vestments. This is to create an atmosphere of simplicity and austerity but not dreariness. We keep an eye on the themes of cross and resurrection, new birth and baptism, light and life.

As we journey through Lent, let these liturgical practices and our own acts of discipline, abstinence and alms-giving, be an aid to our devotion and prayerfulness.

Daily Review of Life

(also called 'The Examination of Consciousness')

In this kind of prayer, I am not trying to “achieve” anything. I am not trying to change the world or change God. I am simply wanting to PAY ATTENTION. God has been with me all through the day, but much of the time I have not been aware of this fact.

God has been trying to guide me, but I haven't always been listening. This type of prayer is about waking up.

This kind of prayer assumes that God is constantly trying to call me to deeper life in Christ and that I can become more sensitive to that call by paying careful attention to my feeling responses through the day.

Step 1: Become present to the moment.

Wherever I am (under a tree; at home; sitting in the train), become aware of the present moment. Observe what I can taste, smell, see, hear, touch. Become aware of any tension in my body (without trying to change or “fix” it). Become aware of the fact that, by God's grace, I am breathing.

Step 2: Placing myself within the “big story”: the Paschal Mystery

Begin by reading and reflecting on a passage of scripture such as from Daily Bible reading notes or a “one-year Bible” or a lectionary.

Step 3: Recollection

Think over what I have done today, since I woke up – all the various activities that I have done and people I have met.

Step 4: Thanksgiving

For what today do I feel most grateful? For example:

- When did I feel especially connected to God or another human being?
Where was Christ today?
- Were there moments when I felt fully alive?
- Were there moments when I felt joy, peace, or compassion (which might have included tears)?
- Were there any moments when I felt really good about loving myself or another person?
- Were there moments when I made a difficult but loving decision?

Feel again the goodness of those moments and thank God for them.

Step 5: Confession

For what today do I feel least grateful? For example:

- When did I feel especially disconnected from God or from another person?
- Were there moments when I was aggressive or abusive of another person?
- Were there moments when I felt disappointment/non-productive anger, stress, or agitation?
- Were there moments when I avoided a necessary action?

In relation to any of the above, ask myself:

- a) What was the unmet need in me?
- b) What underlying assumptions/values were operating in me?

Thank God for these feelings as opportunities to allow God's grace to work in me.

Step 6. Intention/reorientation of desire

- What might I desire to do more of? (laying aside "shoulds/oughts")
- What do I desire to do less of?
- What do I desire to do differently?
- How do I desire for God to help me? (see Romans 7:14-20)

Step 7: Absolution

Finish by making a personal statement which reminds me of God's forgiveness, mercy and absolute love for me and God's world. An example is given below, along with Psalm 139.

God loves me. God wants me to have abundant life. I can do nothing to earn or achieve this love. Nothing I have done or could ever do can separate me from God's love in Christ. This love does not depend on what I think of myself or what other people think of me. My entire value depends on the fact that I am made in God's image and am God's creation. In God's eyes, I am the one who God made and loved before I ever uttered a word or thought a thought. God loves me.
