A reading from the book of Numbers Chapter 21: verses 4-9.

From Mount Hor they set out by the way to the Red Sea, to go around the land of Edom; but the people became impatient on the way. The people spoke against God and against Moses, 'Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness? For there is no food and no water, and we detest this miserable food.' Then the LORD sent poisonous serpents among the people, and they bit the people, so that many Israelites died. The people came to Moses and said, 'We have sinned by speaking against the LORD and against you; pray to the LORD to take away the serpents from us.' So Moses prayed for the people. And the LORD said to Moses, 'Make a poisonous serpent, and set it on a pole; and everyone who is bitten shall look at it and live.' So Moses made a serpent of bronze, and put it upon a pole; and whenever a serpent bit someone, that person would look at the serpent of bronze and live.

O give thanks to the Lord, for he is good: for his loving mercy is for ever. Let the Lord's redeemed say so: whom he has redeemed from the hand of the enemy,

And gathered in from every land, from the east and from the west: from the north and from the south. Fools were far gone in transgression: and because of their sins were afflicted.

They sickened at any food: and had come to the gates of death. Then they cried to the Lord in their distress: and he took them out of their trouble.

A reading from the letter of Paul to the Ephesians, Chapter 2: verses 1 - 10.

You were dead through the trespasses and sins in which you once lived, following the course of this world, following the ruler of the power of the air, the spirit that is now at work among those who are disobedient. All of us once lived among them in the passions of our flesh, following the desires of flesh and senses, and we were by nature children of wrath, like everyone else. But God, who is rich in mercy, out of the great love with which he loved us even when we were dead through our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ—by grace you have been saved— and raised us up with him and seated us with him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus, so that in the ages to come he might show the immeasurable riches of his grace in kindness towards us in Christ Jesus.For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God— not the result of works, so that no one may boast. For we are what he has made us, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand to be our way of life.

MOTHERING SUNDAY – FOURTH SUNDAY IN LENT Because today we are halfway through our Lenten journey, it is sometimes called 'Mid-Lent Sunday'. It is traditionally a day to ease up on the Lenten discipline, hence another common name, 'Refreshment Sunday'. This tradition is seen in the simnel cake, and, in some churches, the wearing of rose-coloured vestments instead of purple ones.

In Latin, the name of the day is Laetare Sunday, from the opening word of the introit used on this day in the old Roman Missal: *Laetare*, or 'rejoice'.

In the sixteenth century, people were encouraged to return on this day to worship in the church in which they were baptised - their 'mother' church. If they still regularly worshipped at their home church, they would visit the cathedral instead, the mother church of their diocese. Hence the name 'Mothering Sunday'. In the Middle Ages, this day became a time when apprentices working away from home could visit their villages and perhaps take a present to their mothers, thus giving Mothering Sunday a family as well as a religious emphasis.

Another name sometimes used is 'Sunday of the Rose'. Formerly, the popes would send a golden rose to Roman Catholic sovereigns, and the rose was blessed on this day. Henry VIII of England received a golden rose on two occasions. Needless to say this was before his dispute with the pope and the separation of the Church of England from Rome!

SAYING "AMEN" AFTER RECEIVING HOLY COMMUNION

The word "Amen" is a Hebrew word that we say and hear frequently in church. Jesus on occasion used the words "Truly, truly, I say to you" or, in the Authorised Version "Verily, verily, I say unto you." A literal translation is "Amen, amen, I say to you." Jesus used the expression to emphasise the importance of the statements or claims he was about to make. He also used it to emphasise the trustworthiness of his teaching, that he spoke with the authority of God. Saying "Amen" after praying is an affirmation of all that has just been prayed for.

The Prayer Book says that after the communicant receives the Eucharist, he or she responds to the words of administration by saying "Amen". In Hebrew, amen comes from the same root as the word 'believe.' It expresses stability, trustworthiness, and faithfulness. It expresses God's faithfulness toward us and our trust in him. Saying "Amen" means that I place my faith in the truth of a particular claim. Jesus said, "I am the bread of life. The one who comes to me shall never be hungry and the one who believes in me shall never be thirsty." To say nothing when we are given a gift would be a strange response, not to mention ill-mannered. Saying "Amen" when we receive the body and blood of Christ speaks volumes about our gratitude, our faith and affirmation of all that God is doing for us in the Eucharist.
