A reading from Isaiah Chapter 6, verses 1 – 8

In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord sitting on a throne, high and lofty; and the hem of his robe filled the temple. Seraphs were in attendance above him; each had six wings: with two they covered their faces, and with two they covered their feet, and with two they flew. And one called to another and said:

'Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts;
the whole earth is full of his glory.'

The pivots on the thresholds shook at the voices of those who called, and the house filled with smoke. And I said: 'Woe is me! I am lost, for I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips; yet my eyes have seen the King, the Lord of hosts!'

Then one of the seraphs flew to me, holding a live coal that had been taken from the altar with a pair of tongs. The seraph touched my mouth with it and said: 'Now that this has touched your lips, your guilt has departed and your sin is blotted out.' Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, 'Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?' And I said, 'Here am I; send me!'

A reading from 1 Corinthians

chapter 15, verses 1 – 11

Now I should remind you, brothers and sisters, of the good news that I proclaimed to you, which you in turn received, in which also you stand, through which also you are being saved, if you hold firmly to the message that I proclaimed to you—unless you have come to believe in vain.

For I handed on to you as of first importance what I in turn had received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures, and that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers and sisters at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. Last of all, as to someone untimely born, he appeared also to me. For I am the least of the apostles, unfit to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace towards me has not been in vain. On the contrary, I worked harder than any of them—though it was not I, but the grace of God that is with me. Whether then it was I or they, so we proclaim and so you have come to believe.

Hear the word of the Lord.

Alleluia, alleluia!

Come follow me, says the Lord,
and I will make you fishers of my people.

**The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to
Luke , Chapter 5, verses 1 – 11**

Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ.

Once while Jesus was standing beside the lake of Gennesaret, and the crowd was pressing in on him to hear the word of God, he saw two boats there at the shore of the lake; the fishermen had gone out of them and were washing their nets. He got into one of the boats, the one belonging to Simon, and asked him to put out a little way from the shore. Then he sat down and taught the crowds from the boat. When he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, 'Put out into the deep water and let down your nets for a catch.' Simon answered, 'Master, we have worked all night long but have caught nothing. Yet if you say so, I will let down the nets.' When they had done this, they caught so many fish that their nets were beginning to break. So they signalled to their partners in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both boats, so that they began to sink. But when Simon Peter saw it, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying, 'Go away from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man!' For he and all who were with him were amazed at the catch of fish that they had taken; and so also were James and John, sons of Zebedee, who were partners with Simon. Then Jesus said to Simon, 'Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching people.' When they had brought their boats to shore, they left everything and followed him.

VOCATION

The word 'vocation' is often regarded as a word that applies only to those whose occupation or career involves some kind of 'call' like the ordained ministry, or nursing, or a teacher or doctor. In reality, all of us are called; each of us has a vocation. When we are baptised, we are commissioned for ministry, telling the Good News of God's love for all. These words are spoken to the newly-baptised: "Go has **called** you into his Church."

The important thing to note is that God takes the initiative in vocation. That doesn't mean everyone has the same vocation. Each vocation is unique to each person.

The theme of today's readings is vocation. There are some common elements in each. First, each one begins with an encounter with God. Isaiah meets God in the Temple. Paul sees the risen Christ. Peter and his fellow fishermen encounter the new rabbi, Jesus. Second, each one expressed his unworthiness: Isaiah confesses his unclean lips and those of his people. Paul says he barely qualifies to be called an apostle. Peter asks Jesus to depart from him because he is a 'sinful man'. Then each experiences a moment of transformation and change and healing and is given a challenge or commission. Isaiah's lips are purified by a burning coal when he hears God's call for a messenger; Paul says it was only by God's grace rather than his own suitability or worthiness that he came to be an apostle; and Peter experiences a huge catch of fish, then he and his partners are called to an even greater fishing trip – that of "fishing for people."

Each call and vocation is different and unique. God meets us as we are and where we are. The fact that the call is from God provides the impetus and the motivation to carry it out. Much exhaustion in churches by many who work the hardest issues from seeing ourselves as "volunteers." The church ends up being treated as another service club or organisation that enlists

volunteers to do good things. The call of Jesus is different. He **calls** and **commissions** us to **follow** him.

Ash Wednesday - Palm Crosses.

Ash Wednesday 6th March marks the beginning of the Season of Lent. This is a Season of penance, contrition, reflection and fasting, a period of 40 days for us to prepare for Christ's Resurrection on Easter Sunday. During this preparation, we are reminded, that **God is gracious and merciful to those who call on Him with repentant hearts.**

Each year the Ashes are prepared using the blessed Palm Crosses from the previous year's Palm Sunday Service.

The symbolic marking of foreheads with ashes, to humble our hearts, remind us that life passes away on Earth. **"Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return".** *Gen. 3:19*
