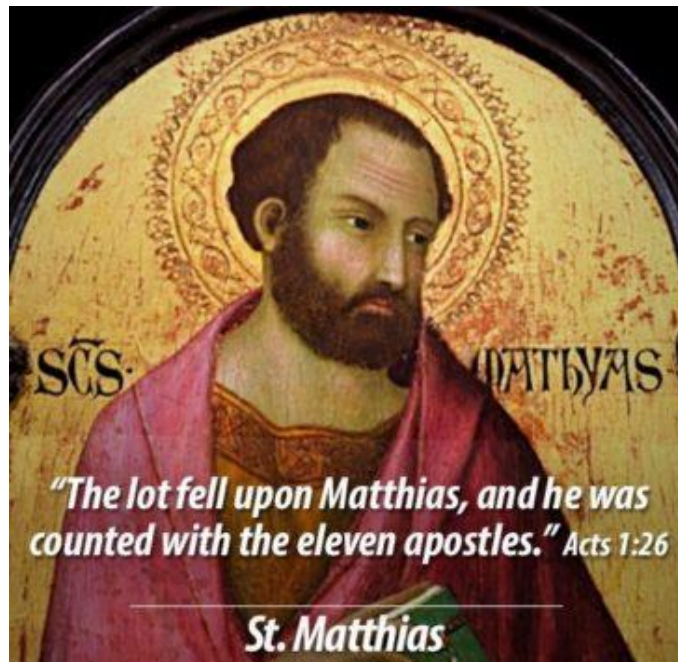

## **A reading from the Acts of the Apostles Chapter 1, verses 14 – 17, 20 – 26**

All these were constantly devoting themselves to prayer,  
together with certain women, including Mary the mother of  
Jesus, as well as his brothers.

In those days Peter stood up among the believers (together the  
crowd numbered about one hundred and twenty people) and  
said, 'Friends, the scripture had to be fulfilled, which the Holy  
Spirit through David foretold concerning Judas, who became a  
guide for those who arrested Jesus— for he was numbered  
among us and was allotted his share in this ministry.'

‘For it is written in the book of Psalms,  
“Let his homestead become desolate,  
and let there be no one to live in it”;  
and

“Let another take his position of overseer.”

So one of the men who have accompanied us throughout the time that the Lord Jesus went in and out among us, beginning from the baptism of John until the day when he was taken up from us—one of these must become a witness with us to his resurrection.’ So they proposed two, Joseph called Barsabbas, who was also known as Justus, and Matthias. Then they prayed and said, ‘Lord, you know everyone’s heart. Show us which one of these two you have chosen to take the place in this ministry and apostleship from which Judas turned aside to go to his own place.’ And they cast lots for them, and the lot fell on Matthias; and he was added to the eleven apostles.

## **CELEBRATING SPECIAL DAYS**

Our society is obsessed with time: how we can use it better, how we can get more done in less time. We've become experts in 'multi-tasking'. When daylight savings begins or ends, we adjust not only our watches (if we still wear them), but all the digital clocks on our appliances – the microwave, the TV, the stereo. Time rules – or tyrannizes – our lives. Time is precious. "Time is money." "Time waits for no man." The emphasis is frequently on using time as a means to an end – usually financial or economic.

As part of God's creation, we humans have always been aware of time – the changing of the seasons, night and day – and we rejoice in the variety and movement of these natural cycles. Woven into these cycles, the religions of the world have their own seasons that celebrate and commemorate different aspects of their understanding of God.

Over time, the liturgical calendar has evolved, forming a rhythm which orders the church's life in a structure of fasts and feasts that form and shape Christians after the pattern of the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. The main festivals of Christmas and Easter have become more commercialised, reducing their spiritual significance for many people, including Christians.

I was brought up in a denomination that, apart from the observance of Christmas, Good Friday and Easter, gave little attention to the church year. One of the features that always attracted me to the Anglican Church was the liturgical calendar. It gave a shape and structure, not only to worship, but to my spiritual life. It is a precious gift that may not always be appreciated by 'cradle' Anglicans. I've discovered that the major festivals have become for too many an opportunity for a short break in the working year, and many lesser feasts are ignored or unknown.

Entering into the seasons and festivals of the church year with joy liberates us from the tyranny of time. We make room for God and become more attuned to the rhythm of our souls, not simply the dictates of the clock or calendar. Experiencing the highs and lows, the light and darkness of the liturgical cycle, frees us from the banality of modern life with its time pressures.

When he was Assistant Bishop of Newcastle, the Rt Rev'd Graeme Rutherford delivered a lecture on religious communities in the 21<sup>st</sup> century at Bateau Bay. He said one of the contributions of religious communities is a biblical call to a 'spirituality of withdrawal'. This is seen in their witness to:

- the priority of prayer and worship
- the importance of building authentic community
- the need for rest and tranquility
- the need for ongoing conversion
- the experience of loss through detachment

We don't have to be members of a religious community to engage in those practices. There are many opportunities to withdraw and to engage in them as members of this Parish.

Today, we celebrate St Matthias. All of us are called to be saints, holy ones, in our following of Christ. The priesthood, the Eucharist, the other sacraments, works of mercy and charity, are all designed to make us saints. The daily Offices of Morning and Evening Prayer provide us the opportunity to hear the scriptures and pray as part of the rhythm of our spiritual lives.

I encourage you to value these precious gifts that have been given to us.

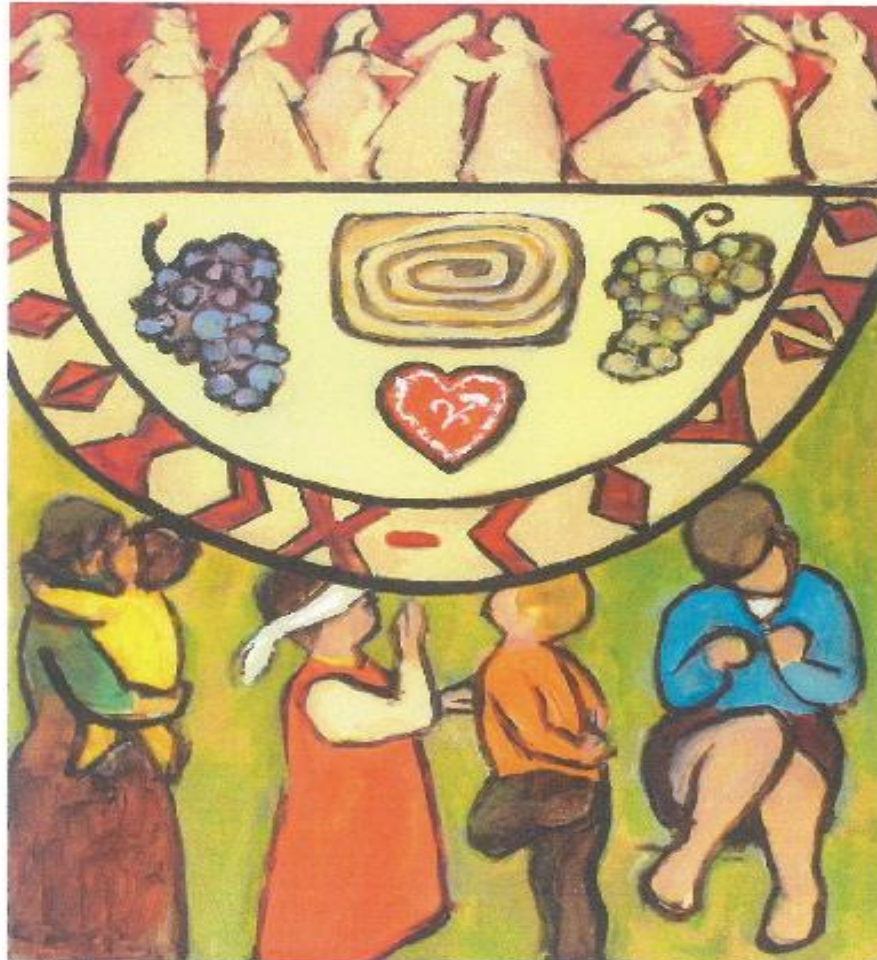

### **Ash Wednesday - Palm Crosses.**

Ash Wednesday 6th March marks the beginning of the Season of Lent. This is a Season of penance, contrition, reflection and fasting, a period of 40 days for us to prepare for Christ's Resurrection on Easter Sunday. During this preparation, we are reminded, that **God is gracious and merciful to those who call on Him with repentant hearts.**

Each year the Ashes are prepared using the blessed Palm Crosses from the previous year's Palm Sunday Service.

The symbolic marking of foreheads with ashes, to humble our hearts, remind us that life passes away on Earth. **"Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return".** *Gen. 3:19*

A Bowl has been placed on the Side table in the gathering space for the collection of the Palm Crosses. Could you please bring your Palm Crosses from last year to place in the bowl, so that they can be prepared and burned as part of the Parish preparations for this year's Ash Wednesday services.
