### **Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ**

Just then a lawyer stood up to test Jesus. 'Teacher,' he said, 'what must I do to inherit eternal life?' He said to him, 'What is written in the law? What do you read there?' He answered, 'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbour as yourself.' And he said to him, 'You have given the right answer; do this, and you will live.'

But wanting to justify himself, he asked Jesus, 'And who is my neighbour?' Jesus replied, 'A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell into the hands of robbers, who stripped him, beat him, and went away, leaving him half dead. ### **Mission Report 14th July 2019 Mission to Seafarers: Sea Sunday**

#### **Prayer for Seafarers**

Heavenly Father, we commend to you all seafarers.

On Sea Sunday, thousands of people gather throughout the world join in prayer, from London to Lagos, Durban to Dunkerque, Melbourne to Manila, and of course in our Diocese, the Port of Newcastle, to celebrate the enduring and vital work of the Mission to Seafarers, to think of the Seafarers welfare. It has been happening for over 160 years.

Sea Sunday is an opportunity to bring to mind the role of seafarers in keeping us supplied with many basic necessities of life and other consumer goods from around the world. Over 90% of the goods we purchase are transported by sea; that trade is reliant on the efforts of seafarers who often undertake their work in difficult circumstances. The Mission to Seafarers provides help and support to the 1.5 million men and women who face danger every day to keep our global economy afloat.

The conditions they experience are often harsh and dangerous, In an emergency, the MtS is often the only help on offer. No matter what problem a seafarer is facing, be it injury, non-payment of wages, abandonment far from home, personal difficulties, or the prevalence of piracy, the Seafarers know they can turn to the Mission for help, advice and support.

Newcastle is the largest and busiest coal port in the world. The Mission to Seafarers Centre in Newcastle is a significant outreach of the diocese and is one of over 260 centres based in ports all over the world.

The Chaplains and volunteers at the Flying Angel/ Stella Maris Seafarer Centre offer care for seafarers of all ranks, nationalities and beliefs, by offering practical, emotional and spiritual support through the ship visits, drop in centre, and a range of welfare, emergency and financial support services, advocacy and family liaison, or simply a space to talk / pray in a time of crisis.

The Centre aims to be a 'home away from home' for seafarers, whose lives are isolated and lonely, and who may have been at sea for up to two years.

The most important thing for the Seafarers to be able to do, is make contact with their family. The Mission Centre is a place where they can enjoy time away from their ship, and use the free internet, and phone facilities to get in touch with their loved ones. There is also a Chapel for personal prayer, and services.

The average size crew is twenty to twenty-two. As only a percentage of crews can come ashore, if any at all, there is a small ship-visiting team whose role is to go on-board as many vessels as possible. At times services and prayer also take place onboard the ships, and this is important for those unable to go on shore

leave. The visiting team also bear gifts of magazines and novels, beanies.....etc. Because of the very short turn-around time captains and chief cooks rarely have time to go ashore. They love talking to anyone, especially about their families

The Flying Angel Seafarers' Centre in Newcastle also provide transport, provide free clothing, food, entertainment, pastoral care, books/bibles/etc, ship visiting, and arrange for medical and dental appointments, as well as visit the seafarers who are injured or have fallen ill and are in hospital.

There are various ways you can help to support seafarers' welfare: Start talking about seafarers' welfare and help to raise awareness – stop and consider how the things we rely on daily arrived to our table. Develop concern for the humanitarian aspects of the work, or perhaps begin to consider the ways in which welfare services reduce the likelihood of seafarer fatigue and contributes to safer shipping.

The mission relies on the generosity of parishioners from the churches across the diocese. Please remember the contribution that seafarers make to our daily lives, and the Mission to Seafarers which supports them.

## **Pew Reflections**

### **The Fifth Sunday After Pentecost [OS 14] – Sunday 14 July 2019**

- Amos 7.7-17; Psalm 82  
Colossians 1.1-14; Luke 10.25-37

Paul implies that the gospel is for all people, mentioning that it is being proclaimed everywhere and is changing people's lives. It proves its power in the love that people show to one another and to others – being the neighbour that Jesus challenges the lawyer (and us) to be in today's Gospel. This is extra challenging when we realise that part of the point of Jesus' story is that even our enemies are our neighbours. A Samaritan helping a Jew was about as likely as an Islamist Muslim helping a Christian! Thus, the parable is the supreme example of both love for neighbour and love for enemies.

- Pray 'that you may lead lives worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to him'.
- Give thanks for the work and witness of the Anglican Church of Korea, the *Daehan Seong Gong Hoe*.
