This is right and is acceptable in the sight of God our Saviour, who desires everyone to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth. For

there is one God;

there is also one mediator between God and humankind, Christ Jesus, himself human,

who gave himself a ransom for all

—this was attested at the right time. For this I was appointed a herald and an apostle (I am telling the truth, I am not lying), a teacher of the Gentiles in faith and truth.

Then Jesus said to the disciples, 'There was a rich man who had a manager, and charges were brought to him that this man was squandering his property. So he summoned him and said to him, "What is this that I hear about you? Give me an account of your management, because you cannot be my manager any longer." Then the manager said to himself, "What will I do, now that my master is taking the position away from me? I am not strong enough to dig, and I am ashamed to beg. I have decided what to do so that, when I am dismissed as manager, people may welcome me into their homes." So, summoning his master's debtors one by one, he asked the first, "How much do you owe my master?" He answered, "A hundred jugs of olive oil." He said to him, "Take your bill, sit down quickly, and make it fifty." Then he asked another, "And how much do you owe?" He replied, "A hundred containers of wheat." He said to him, "Take your bill and make it eighty." And his master commended the dishonest manager because he had acted shrewdly; for the children of this age are more shrewd in dealing with their own generation than are the children of light. And I tell you, make friends for yourselves by means of dishonest wealth so that when it is gone, they may welcome you into the eternal homes.

'Whoever is faithful in a very little is faithful also in much; and whoever is dishonest in a very little is dishonest also in much. If then you have not been faithful with the dishonest wealth, who will entrust to you the true riches? And if you have not been faithful with what belongs to another, who will give you what is your own? No slave can serve two masters; for a slave will either hate the one and love the other, or be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and wealth.'

DID YOU HEAR ...?

How often has a conversation begun, "Did you hear about so-and so?" "No. Tell me." Dr Richard Carlson, in a delightful little book, Don't Sweat the Small Stuff with Your Family, writes, "When you talk behind someone's back, it says far less about the person you are discussing than it does about your own character, about your need to be critical and your need to talk behind other people's backs. It's like hitting a person who is down- the person you are talking about is not able to defend himself or herself. It's not fair."

Why talk about gossip? For one thing it seems to be something of an epidemic in our society. There's been for a while now a whole range of publications that are nicknamed gossip magazines. The advent of so-called 'reality TV' gave us a voyeuristic peek into strange people doing weird things. Trials and tribulations of the rich and famous, or scandal involving public figures like politicians and entertainers, provide us with a delicious feast of 'news' items that fill the airwaves and printed media. The internet has taken this to a new and nasty level. In August 2016, TIME magazine had a cover story called, "Why we're losing the Internet to the culture of hate." Sam Altman, who ran Reddit for eight days after a PR crisis, says in the article, "Now everyone on the Internet is a public figure. The problem is that not everyone can deal with that." He later quit Twitter (he had 171,000 followers) saying "I feel worse after using Twitter . . . my brain gets polluted here." Like air pollution, the effects are not noticed until the damage has been done.

Gossip makes us feel powerful because we place ourselves in the position of judge and jury without the person being present to defend himself or herself. This is why we have proper processes for dealing with criminal behaviour through the courts instead of

a free-for-all approach involving mob violence. A form of 'lynching' takes place when someone is judged and sentenced by hearsay and gossip. What starts out as 'innocent' conversation or online posts ends up being an exercise in mob psychology and gross injustice.

The Bible has a bit to say about this destructive form of behaviour. "A gossip goes about telling secrets, but one who is trustworthy in spirit keeps a confidence" (Prov. 11:13). "A perverse person spreads strife, and a whisperer separates close friends" (Prov. 16:28). "Without wood a fire goes out; without gossip a quarrel dies down" (Prov. 26:20). "The words of a whisperer are like delicious morsels; they go down into the inner parts of the body" (Prov. 26:22). Gossip has a cancerous effect on us. St Paul, writing to the church in Corinth, says, "I fear that when I come, I may find you not as I wish, and that you may not find me as you wish; I fear that there may perhaps be quarrelling, jealousy, anger, selfishness, slander, gossip, conceit, and disorder" (2 Cor. 12:20).

When Jesus was on trial before Pilate, he was slandered with false accusations. He kept silent. Next time someone comes to you with a 'delicious morsel' of info about another person, or you read it somewhere, gently refuse to get involved. Perhaps turn the conversation in another direction or say something positive or just remain silent. Give it a go and see how much better you feel inside.

Pew Reflections

The Fifteenth Sunday After Pentecost [Pentecost 15] - Sunday 22 September 2019

Jeremiah 8.18 – 9.1; Psalm 79.1-9
 either 1 Timothy 2.1-10 or 1 Timothy 3.14 – 4.6;
 Luke 16.1-13

Today's Gospel is somewhat mind bending, with a 'wealth' of facets – relating to wealth. The master sacked his manager because of his dishonesty but could not help admiring his ingenuity in seeking to ensure his material future. Jesus' point is that his disciples (including us) are called to practise the same kind of single-mindedness in *spiritual* matters, including generosity towards others – accumulating 'true riches' through growing in our relationship with the Lord, compared with the wealth of this world, which is 'dishonest' because it can fool us into a false security where we are depending on it as central to our lifestyle. The fact is that the wealth of this world is really only an 'add-on' to our lives – useful for this life only.

- Give thanks for the wealth of resources God provides, and pray that you may serve God with your 'wealth'.
