**A Reading from the First Book of Kings
Chapter 2, verses 1 to 2, 6 – 12.**

When David's time to die drew near, he charged his son Solomon, saying: 'I am about to go the way of all the earth. Be strong, be courageous.

Act therefore according to your wisdom, but do not let his grey head go down to Sheol in peace. Deal loyally, however, with the sons of Barzillai the Gileadite, and let them be among those who eat at your table; for with such loyalty they met me when I fled from your brother Absalom. There is also with you Shimei son of Gera, the Benjaminite from Bahurim, who cursed me with a terrible curse on the day when I went to Mahanaim; but when he came down to meet me at the Jordan, I swore to him by the LORD, "I will not put you to death with the sword." Therefore do not hold him guiltless, for you are a wise man; you will know what you ought to do to him, and you must bring his grey head down with blood to Sheol.'

Then David slept with his ancestors, and was buried in the city of David. The time that David reigned over Israel was forty years; he reigned for seven years in Hebron, and thirty-three years in Jerusalem. So Solomon sat on the throne of his father David; and his kingdom was firmly established.

DISASTER RELIEF

Samaritans is one of a number of government and non-government organisations working together under the NSW State Disaster Plan to provide an effective and coordinated response when major emergencies occur. The Samaritans offers:

- * Assistance in caring for individuals and communities affected by major emergencies
- * Training to heighten the understanding of emergency management and disaster recovery.

The Samaritans Disaster Recovery, in partnership with the Anglican community, provides support in the Disaster Recovery - Welfare Services area, working under the Ministry for Police and Emergency Services and the Department of Family and Community Services (FaCS) and alongside

* ADRA (Seventh Day Adventist Church) * The Salvation Army * Australian Red Cross

These agencies work together with ANGLICARE / Samaritans to support the restoration of emotional, social, economic and physical well being in disaster affected communities (emergency situations including bushfire, floods and storms) delivering Christian care to those impacted.

Local groups of trained volunteers - Samaritans Disaster Recovery Teams - play a vital role in delivering practical care and assistance to those affected by disasters.

A reading from the Letter of Paul to the Galatians Chapter 5, verses 1, 13-25

For freedom Christ has set us free. Stand firm, therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery.

For you were called to freedom, brothers and sisters; only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for self-indulgence, but through love become slaves to one another. For the whole law is summed up in a single commandment, 'You shall love your neighbour as yourself.' If, however, you bite and devour one another, take care that you are not consumed by one another.

Live by the Spirit, I say, and do not gratify the desires of the flesh. For what the flesh desires is opposed to the Spirit, and what the Spirit desires is opposed to the flesh; for these are opposed to each other, to prevent you from doing what you want. But if you are led by the Spirit, you are not subject to the law. Now the works of the flesh are obvious: fornication, impurity, licentiousness, idolatry, sorcery, enmities, strife, jealousy, anger, quarrels, dissensions, factions, envy, drunkenness, carousing, and things like these. I am warning you, as I warned you before: those who do such things will not inherit the kingdom of God.

By contrast, the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against such things. And those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. If we live by the Spirit, let us also be guided by the Spirit.

Adamstown, Belmont North, Cessnock, East Maitland, Gorokan, Mayfield, Morriset, Taree, Toronto, Toukley, West Lakes, and Wyoming. This emphasises the great demand that is currently being placed on these local centres.

MISSION 30th June

This week I am pleased to feature an article which has been written by our Samaritans Link Officer Anna Holt, who volunteers at one of the Central Coast Samaritans Emergency Relief Centres, located at Wyoming.

Anna writes....

This centre operates out of the Anglican Church at Wyoming. It is open on Mondays and Fridays from 10am till 1.30pm and is staffed entirely by volunteers. There are 10 women and 4 men who interview clients, and 2 women who pack the food parcels. Volunteers are rostered-on once or twice a month.

The only State government assistance to the Centre comes in the form of vouchers which help the clients with electricity/gas costs for a total of two bills per financial year. The majority of our funding comes from the generosity of Central Coast Anglicans who also supply some of our food. The money is used to buy extra food, to pay for medicinal needs or to provide small amounts of petty cash. Food parcels are provided in family size or single size.

Most of our clients are on Centrelink benefits and are in private or government rental accommodation. Because the cost of accommodation is so expensive they have little money left for general living costs. We rarely see clients who are homeowners. Ellie Murphy and I have been volunteers there for over ten years and we will happily talk to anyone who may be interested in joining us, or who wants to know more detail about the Centre.
