# 1 Samuel Chapter 16, verses 1-13

The LORD said to Samuel, 'How long will you grieve over Saul? I have rejected him from being king over Israel. ## Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ

As he walked along, he saw a man blind from birth. His disciples asked him, 'Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?' Jesus answered, 'Neither this man nor his parents sinned; he was born blind so that God's works might be revealed in him. We must work the works of him who sent me while it is day; night is coming when no one can work. As long as I am in the world, I am the light of the world.' When he had said this, he spat on the ground and made mud with the saliva and spread the mud on the man's eyes, saying to him, 'Go, wash in the pool of Siloam' (which means Sent). Then he went and washed and came back able to see. The neighbours and those who had seen him before as a beggar began to ask, 'Is this not the man who used to sit and beg?' Some were saying, 'It is he.' Others were saying, 'No, but it is someone like him.' He kept saying, 'I am the man.' But they kept asking him, 'Then how were your eyes opened?' He answered, 'The man called Jesus made mud, spread it on my eyes, and said to me, "Go to Siloam and wash." Then I went and washed and received my sight.' They said to him, 'Where is he?' He said, 'I do not know.'

They brought to the Pharisees the man who had formerly been blind. Now it was a sabbath day when Jesus made the mud and opened his eyes. Then the Pharisees also began to ask him how he had received his sight. He said to them, 'He put mud on my eyes. Then I washed, and now I see.' Some of the Pharisees said, 'This man is not from God, for he does not observe the sabbath.' But others said, 'How can a man who is a sinner perform such signs?' And they were divided. So they said again to the blind man, 'What do you say about him? It was your eyes he opened.' He said, 'He is a prophet.'

The Jews did not believe that he had been blind and had received his sight until they called the parents of the man who had received his sight and asked them, 'Is this your son, who you say was born blind? How then does he now see?' His parents answered, 'We know that this is our son, and that he was born blind; but we do not know how it is that now he sees, nor do we know who opened his eyes. Ask him; he is of age. He will speak for himself.' His parents said this because they were afraid of the Jews; for the Jews had already agreed that anyone who confessed Jesus to be the Messiah would be put out of the synagogue. Therefore his parents said, 'He is of age; ask him.'

So for the second time they called the man who had been blind, and they said to him, 'Give glory to God! We know that this man is a sinner.' He answered, 'I do not know whether he is a sinner. One thing I do know, that though I was blind, now I see.' They said to him, 'What did he do to you? How did he open your eyes?' He answered them, 'I have told you already, and you would not listen. Why do you want to hear it again? Do you also want to become his disciples?' Then they reviled him, saying, 'You are his disciple, but we are disciples of Moses. We know that God has spoken to Moses, but as for this man, we do not know where he comes from.' The man answered, 'Here is an astonishing thing! You do not know where he comes from, and yet he opened my eyes. We know that God does not listen to sinners, but he does listen to one who worships him and obeys his will. Never since the world began has it been heard that anyone opened the eyes of a person born blind. If this man were not from God, he could do nothing.' They answered him, 'You were born entirely in sins, and are you trying to teach us?' And they drove him out.

Jesus heard that they had driven him out, and when he found him, he said, 'Do you believe in the Son of Man?' He answered, 'And who is he, sir? Tell me, so that I may believe in him.' Jesus said to him, 'You have seen him, and the one speaking with you is he.' He said, 'Lord, I believe.' And he worshipped him. Jesus said, 'I came into this world for judgement so that those who do not see may see, and those who do see may become blind.' Some of the Pharisees near him heard this and said to him, 'Surely we are not blind, are we?' Jesus said to them, 'If you were blind, you would not have sin. But now that you say, "We see", your sin remains.

# MOTHERING SUNDAY – FOURTH SUNDAY IN LENT

Because today we are halfway through our Lenten journey, it is sometimes called 'Mid-Lent Sunday'. It is traditionally a day to ease up on the Lenten discipline, hence another common name, 'Refreshment Sunday'. This tradition is seen in the simnel cake, and, in some churches, the wearing of rose-coloured vestments instead of purple ones.

In Latin, the name of the day is Laetare Sunday, from the opening word of the introit used on this day in the old Roman Missal: *Laetare*, or 'rejoice'.

In the sixteenth century, people were encouraged to return on this day to worship in the church in which they were baptised their 'mother' church. If they still regularly worshipped at their home church, they would visit the cathedral instead, the mother church of their diocese. Hence the name 'Mothering Sunday'. In the Middle Ages, this day became a time when apprentices working away from home could visit their villages and perhaps take a present to their mothers, thus giving Mothering Sunday a family as well as a religious emphasis.

Another name sometimes used is 'Sunday of the Rose'. Formerly, the popes would send a golden rose to Roman Catholic sovereigns, and the rose was blessed on this day. Henry VIII of England received a golden rose on two occasions. Needless to say this was before his dispute with the pope and the separation of the Church of England from Rome!

# **PAYING ATTENTION DURING LENT**

Lent is a time of stripping bare, letting go the non-essentials and focusing on the essence of our following of Christ. Lent is an opportunity for us to strengthen the spiritual life by eradicating those distractions and diversions which prevent us hearing clearly.

With the reality of COVID-19 (Coronavirus) affecting our lives in unprecedented ways, we are, in a sense, being "forced" to let go even those things that provide spiritual nourishment and sustenance which are even more important during times like these. Anglican Churches will be closed, and all services activities suspended until further notice.

Your clergy will continue saying the Daily Offices of Morning and Evening Prayer. We are exploring ways of keeping you informed and providing spiritual help online, especially through our Facebook page. As we are being encouraged to stay indoors and to self-isolate, we can use the time for silence and attending to the voice of God.

During Lent we can ask ourselves at the end of each day how we have kept alert to God and how we have been made aware of God during the day. Lent is about listening and attentiveness; listening to God to be drawn into closer relationship to him.

It is impossible to listen without silence. Have you ever tried to engage someone in conversation, but they don't really hear what you're trying to tell them? They seem interested only in what *they* have to say. Even when they're not saying anything, you can tell they're thinking what to say next, rather than really hearing what *you're* saying. Today there is a tendency in our society for people to talk *past* each other rather than *to* each other. We tend to be distracted by our own ideas and opinions.

The writer of an article from the online forum *Aleteia* asked the question: "How can we be less distracted and more attentive, to

take more of an interest in and be more open-minded about the opinions and concerns of others?" He refers to St Benedict who asked himself the same question in the sixth century. Benedict tried to form a focused, peaceful environment for his community of monks who struggled with their own distractions. Benedict wrote a Rule of Life for the monks to assist them to do this. The first word in the Rule is *Listen*. "Listen and incline the ear of your heart." Before we speak, the best place to begin is to be quiet and listen. When we listen to others, we may hear things we don't like but which may be important.

When we listen to God, distractions recede into the background. Listening is taking time to hear with an attitude of openness. This is vital in our world of distractions.

Benedict also talks about listening with "obedience". This isn't military obedience or blindly obeying instructions. It comes from the Latin *obaudiens* meaning "to listen carefully", to listen from a heart of stillness.

# **CORONAVIRUS (COVID-19) CHURCH PRACTICES UPDATE**

The Bishop has issued the following guidelines – updated March  $10^{th}$  – for churches to follow during the Coronavirus threat.

Good hygiene practices prevent the spread of infection, including:

- Washing your hands often with soap and water
- Using a tissue and covering your mouth when you cough or sneeze
- Avoiding close contact with others, such as touching

In addition to the above the Bishop has also authorised and requested the suspension of:

- Physical contact during the greeting of peace
- Physical contact during a blessing or "laying on of hands"
- The administration of the chalice to the congregation which means Holy Communion will be administered in one kind only

Priests and servers will wash their hands with hand sanitiser before setting up the communion vessels containing the elements and prior to administering the elements.

Some people have asked for explanation of the meaning of some terms, i.e., "Host" which is the name of the consecrated bread. It comes from the Latin *hostias* which means "victim". "Intinction" refers to the practice of dipping the Host in the consecrated wine. This is to be avoided as it represents an infection transmission route.

Please consume the Sacrament as soon as you receive it and do not take it away with you.

Care needs to be taken about food service. Consideration should be given to serving food rather than food being offered for selfservice. Good hygiene practices must be followed in the kitchen.

Thank you again for your consideration and co-operation.
