LIGHTING OF THE FIRST ADVENT CANDLE

COME, LORD JESUS. The prophet Isaiah implored God to tear the heavens open and come down to save the people. God, however, did not come among us in such a dramatic way but in the humble form of Jesus of Nazareth. God continues to enter our lives in unexpected ways. If we are watchful for the presence of Christ in each day, we will recognise him when he comes in glory.

Today we light the candle of hope to recall the hope we have in Christ. We await the fullness of God's reign in Christ and seek to live as citizens of that kingdom now. Hope is like a light shining in a dark place. As we look at the light of this candle, we celebrate the hope we have in Jesus Christ.

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark Chapter 13 verses 24-37

Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ.

'But in those days, after that suffering, the sun will be darkened,

and the moon will not give its light, and the stars will be falling from heaven,

and the powers in the heavens will be shaken.

Then they will see "the Son of Man coming in clouds" with great power and glory. Then he will send out the angels, and gather his elect from the four winds, from the ends of the earth to the ends of heaven.

'From the fig tree learn its lesson: as soon as its branch becomes tender and puts forth its leaves, you know that summer is near. So also, when you see these things taking place, you know that he is near, at the very gates. Truly I tell you, this generation will not pass away until all these things have taken place. Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away.

'But about that day or hour no one knows, neither the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. Beware, keep alert; for you do not know when the time will come. It is like a man going on a journey, when he leaves home and puts his slaves in charge, each with his work, and commands the doorkeeper to be on the watch. Therefore, keep awake—for you do not know when the master of the house will come, in the evening, or at midnight, or at cockcrow, or at dawn, or else he may find you asleep when he comes suddenly. And what I say to you I say to all: Keep awake.'

Fr. Roy writes: As I have listened to and thought about the pandemic during the past weeks, two concepts have come to mind. First, how infectious is the virus? Secondly "Health minister, Greg Hunt says the SA cluster is a reminder that outbreaks are inevitable." There is nothing new in either of these concepts. I thought, however, that it was a good launching pad for my writing this week.

The answer to the first question is extremely infectious. You only need to look at the world-wide figure to agree with that and the deadliness of the results. Putting this into our context as Christians, the question becomes "are we as infectious with our faith"? In Romans 1:7, Paul said he was addressing the Roman letter to "all who are in Rome, beloved of God, called to be saints." In I Corinthians 1:2, Paul addressed the Corinthian letter to "the church of God, which is in Corinth, to those who are sanctified in Christ Jesus, called to be saints." Now transpose that into to-day's world and we read "to all who are in Terrigal, beloved of God, called to be saints." This is you and I who are called to be saints and to live as citizens of heaven. Look now at the saints in heaven and you will find people who suffered as we do, who struggled hard with temptations, sins and doubts and fears. How did they go from being called to be saints on earth to be saints in heaven? They would answer through the sacrifice of Jesus on the Cross and his resurrection. They tried then to follow Jesus' footsteps throughout their life and be inspired by his zeal for teaching people in the ways of God.

The health minister's comment about "the SA cluster and outbreaks", brought me to thinking of "cluster" in terms of the people of our parish and the congregations on Friday and Sunday. Last Sunday's Gospel was the Parable of the Talents (Matthew 25: 14-30). It is an open-ended Parable allowing each person to find their own interpretation, its specific solution for that person. We have different talents that we discover as time goes by in our lives. They are to be used for God's work within the Body of Christ and within the world and for the benefit of humankind. What, then, can I do to bring my talents to the fore and to use them in this way so that I do not lose the talent? PRAY, PRAY and PRAY. An outbreak of results is inevitable. Come Holy Spirit, come and touch the lives of your people. Open our lips, Lord, that our mouth shall proclaim your praise. Our help is in the Name of the Lord who made heaven and earth. Keep well, keep safe and the blessing of God be upon you and on all who you love and may your days and nights be holy, good and peaceful.

Advent 1

A new ecclesiastical year begins for the Western Church today. Isaiah 64.1-9; Psalm 80.1-7, 17-19;

1 Corinthians 1.1-9; Mark 13.24-37

It seems that the Roman Emperor Vespasian needed a striking victory to establish his rule, and so what had begun as the quelling of a revolt in Palestine, became an utter destruction. If you are taken to the base of the Temple Mount in Jerusalem today, you will see huge stones from the second temple, some as large as houses, tossed from the top of the Mount. It would have taken enormous effort, even as it would today, to accomplish this.

Advent calls us again to consider the coming of Christ and Mark chapter 13 plunges us into his vision of the future. It reminds us that most of what we regard as permanent in our own lives is in fact temporary. Ultimately what we can rely on is Christ. *Come Lord Jesus!*

The Christmas Bowl is an ecumenical appeal bringing together the 18 member churches of the National Council of Churches in Australia.

The First Sunday of Advent: Keeping hope alive for girls in Afghanistan.

Hope keeps us going in bleak times. It's faith that God's love will prevail in our lives. But COVID-19 is dashing the hopes of Afghani girls to go to school and escape the oppression they were born into. This Christmas, please help girls like Jaleela* to keep learning – and restore their hopes for the future.

Jaleela didn't start school until she was eight, because girls ' education wasn't encouraged in her community. But thanks to your support, Act for Peace's partner organisation showed her dad the benefits of having an educated daughter. Because of this advocacy, ten-year-old Jaleela has been getting the education that both her father and mother missed out on. She loves school, and wants to help build a better future for her conflict-torn country. Jaleela said: "There is a lot of fighting in this country, so I should become a doctor."

Sadly, COVID-19 is now making it even harder for girls like Jaleela to learn and realise their dreams. Afghanistan's schools closed in March to stop the spread of the virus. And most children don't have internet access, or even a TV or radio, to learn remotely.

The lockdown is particularly hurting girls, who are already the most vulnerable in their society. As their families come under greater financial strain, many girls are being forced to work, to care for their households, or into early marriages.

The longer girls go without learning, the more likely they will lose their hard-won right to go to school for good. But through your gift to the Christmas Bowl, you can help show them a life of hope and opportunity is still within reach.

Your kindness will help Act for Peace's local partner, Community World Service Asia (CWSA), create and distribute self-learning packages to children across Afghanistan.

You'll help run awareness sessions for families, so they understand how important it is to keep their daughters in school, and you will allow CWSA to train more teachers so they can provide the best, child-centred classes as schools reopen.

Education brings hope. Please give this Christmas and renew that hope for girls in Afghanistan.
