HOLY WEEK AND EASTER LITURGIES 2021

Holy Week is a time of special attention given to the commemoration of Our Lord's Passion. This pattern had its origin in Jerusalem, beginning at the Mount of Olives and ending at the Great Church in Jerusalem.

The liturgies of the **Easter Triduum**: Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and the Great Vigil of Easter are really one great liturgy rather than three separate events. Together they celebrate the great drama of our salvation in Christ, so the Liturgies for Maundy Thursday and Good Friday do not conclude with a Blessing as the story is not yet complete. It therefore makes sense to attend all three liturgies to enter more fully into the drama of these saving events.

PASSION (PALM) SUNDAY

The two main emphases on this day are the Procession with Palms commemorating Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, and the Eucharist, which includes the dramatic reading of the Passion. Palm crosses are blessed and distributed to the congregation.

MAUNDY THURSDAY

The name 'maundy' comes from the Latin *mandatum*, which means "commandment'. On this day Jesus gave his disciples the new commandment that they love one another. He washed their feet as a sign of that love.

The liturgy is held in the evening and is full of symbolism. The Gospel reading speaks of love and service, which are vividly expressed in the washing of feet, recalling Jesus' washing the feet of the twelve disciples. Usually, people from the congregation are invited to come forward and have their feet washed. This year, the foot washing will be limited to two people washing each other's feet.

On this night we remember Jesus' Last Supper when he instituted the Holy Eucharist. At the conclusion, the Altar and Sanctuary are stripped of their hangings and ornaments as a sign of the desolation of the cross. The Blessed Sacrament (the consecrated bread and wine left from communion) is carried to the Founders' Chapel and placed on the altar – the 'Altar of Repose' - and stays there all night. The sacrament is then used for communion on Good Friday. A Vigil of Prayer is kept before the Blessed Sacrament for one hour as a way of sharing with Jesus who prayed in the Garden of Gethsemane before his arrest and asked his "Could you not watch with me one hour?"

GOOD FRIDAY

The **Liturgy of the day** is at **9.00am.** It is marked by simplicity and austerity, but it must not be seen as Jesus' 'funeral'. We celebrate the Lord's triumph on the cross and call the day *Good* Friday – something which is only possible if we see Jesus' death from the perspective of his resurrection. We hear the Word of God, including the Dramatic Reading of the Passion of St John; the cross is brought into the Church then venerated; we pray for the world and the church for which Jesus died; then we receive Holy Communion from bread consecrated at the Maundy Thursday Liturgy the night before.

HOLY SATURDAY - THE GREAT VIGIL OF EASTER

This liturgy celebrates the Christian Passover, the victory of Christ over the powers of darkness. Light is a prominent theme in the symbols, readings and hymns.

The liturgy begins at **7pm**. The new fire is kindled, the paschal candle lit from the fire, then carried into the darkened church. All this reminds us that the rest of the Easter celebration is seen in the light of the presence of the Risen Christ.

The Ministry of the Word includes readings that rehearse God's saving acts in the history of Israel, preparing for the presence of Christ.

In the early church, Easter was the time for baptisms, so the water in the font is blessed, we renew our baptismal promises, and are sprinkled with water to remember our baptism. The service continues with the celebration of the Easter Eucharist.

EASTER DAY

On Easter Day we gather for two joyful celebrations of the Eucharist. At the **8.00am** Sung Eucharist, the Easter Garden is blessed; and the Eucharist at **9.30am**. The Easter Season lasts for fifty days, until Pentecost. During this time, the Paschal Candle is alight at all liturgies, the Alleluia is sung again, a festive form of the Great Thanksgiving is used, and we sing hymns and songs of joy.

You are warmly invited to enter into these special days with prayerful expectancy, experiencing the presence of the crucified and raised Jesus as he transforms us through word and sacrament.

Fr. Roy writes: Welcome to the most sacred week of the Christian year. This is Holy Week, commencing with Palm Sunday, otherwise known as Sunday of the Passion and finishing with Holy Saturday or Easter Eve. What a contrast there is between the beginning of the Liturgy for this morning and the remainder of the week? First, there was the triumphal entry of Jesus riding a donkey, a sign of the entry of a King into the capital city, Jerusalem peaceably. The entry was accompanied with palm branches scattered on the roadway over which Jesus rode to the shouts of "Hosanna". The liturgy for the Eucharist then proceeds with the Gospel Reading of the Passion of our Lord according to Mark. The Gospel readings for the remainder of Holy Week are from the Passion according to John. This final trip of Jesus to

Jerusalem was the culmination of his life and teaching after his baptism in the River Jordan by John the Baptizer. The Passion of Jesus lead to the arrest, the trial, the scoffing, the indignities of Crucifixion and His death and burial. What, then, was the purpose of this? Much has been written of this by scholars over the centuries and much more will be written in times to come. I find it helpful to refer back to the Scriptures where Jesus, in prayer on the Mount of Olives, said "Father, if you are willing, remove this cup from me, yet not my will but yours be done." Luke 22:42.

"Christ himself bore our sins in his body on the cross, so that, free from sins, we might live for righteousness, by his wounds you have been healed." 1 Peter 2:24.

Here is a prayer for you to use during this week:

"Blessed are you, Lord God of our salvation, to you be praise and glory for ever.

As a man of sorrows and acquainted with grief your only Son was lifted up that he might draw the whole world to himself.

May we walk this day in the way of the cross and always be ready to share its weight, declaring your love for all the world.

Blessed be God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Blessed be God for ever." From the Daily Office of the Church of England.

Come, Son of God Incarnate, Jesus of Nazareth, come and touch the lives of your people.

Keep well, keep safe and the blessing of God be upon you and on all who you love and may your days and nights be holy, good and peaceful. AMEN.

Palm Sunday Holy Week begins

- Sunday 28 March 2021
- The Palm Gospel: Mark 11.1-11
- Isaiah 50.4-9a; Psalm 31.9-18; Philippians 2.5-11
- The Passion: Mark 14.1 - 15.27
- Jesus goes into Jerusalem on the back of a donkey with cloaks and branches strewn on the road ahead to shouts of 'Hosanna!'. A far cry from the events of the Friday to come. Friday. The one day that shook the world. Time is important. In the morning, Jesus was condemned, at 9am he was crucified, at noon the world darkened and at 3pm Jesus died. People mocked Jesus as if the Messiah could be up on a cross, dying. And then there were the women. Jesus' women

followers were there. They saw the tomb. They thought they knew where Jesus was.

Your gift this Good Friday to the Holy Land Institute for the Deaf will help children with sensory disabilities, especially those from poor and unemployed families, to receive scholarships which provide access to quality education. The scholarships also enable the children to access vocational training so that they may live full and productive lives.

The Anglican Diocese of Jerusalem and the Middle East, which owns and operates the Institute, seeks funds to provide scholarships so that more children from poor families can access these enriched and tailored education programs.

The Holy Land Institute for the Deaf is located in the city of Salt, in the north of Jordan. It serves the needs of children with hearing impairment, and those who are both hearing and vision impaired. It provides holistically for the education and medical needs of 120 children. This is vital work in a part of the world where money is scarce, and children with disabilities are often miss out.

As the economic and political situation in the Middle East worsens, exacerbated by the impacts of COVID-19, these children need your support more than ever.

During the worst of the COVID-19 epidemic, the school, like all schools in Jordan, was forced to close. However, the teachers had prepared stimulating distance learning modules for their students, and the school was able to provide laptops for those who could not afford them at home. This allowed the students and teachers to stay in contact and enabled vital learning to continue.

With your help, children's lives can be turned around. Your donation can enable more children currently facing such multiple disadvantages to receive a free, quality education. They will learn new skills, mix with other children, be able to participate more fully in their family and community life, and go on to join their peers in contributing to their communities upon graduation.
