Fr Roy Writes: Later in the year we celebrate the Feast of Christ the King. It is a time when we think about, talk about and sing about "Christ the Servant King". Yes! The Servant King. Jesus Christ came into the world to serve the people of the world with redemption and grace to follow him in their life on this earth. He spoke in parables of servants as slaves to the master and for using the talents they had been given to the master's advantage and for which they received a reward.

In my young days there was no such thing as a "teenager". You were a student at school or university or in an apprenticeship or a worker in a job. I did both, I worked from 7.30am to 5.00pm and studied for a profession at night. When I was 19, I decided to spend my holidays from work finding a bit more of Australia than Newcastle and the New England area. Off I went on a coach tour. When Sunday morning came, I went to a large well-known church for the Eucharist. I pulled open the heavy door, walked in and being an Anglican, I sat close to the back of the church building. No one spoke to me and the same applied as the service concluded. I had spoken to the Servant King in the words of the Eucharist but not one of the servants of the Servant King had spoken to this fellow servant.

The following Sunday the tour stopped for the night at a small seaside town. After dinner I found the parish church and saw that Evening Prayer was soon to be prayed. After another walk, I came back in time for the service. This time I was welcomed at the door and handed a Prayer Book and a Hymn Book and directed to a vacant seat amid the congregation where the people around me spoke to me and made me most welcome. At the conclusion of the service the Rector invited me to have supper at the Rectory. On arrival there was several other young people who had been in the church, and we chatted and had supper. You can see the impression the two events had on me. I had moved outside of my comfort zone and had two very different experiences.

Prior to the present pandemic, the servants of the Servant King regarded the virtue of hospitality as important. As the congregation arrived at the door on a Sunday morning for the Eucharist a fellow servant opened the door with words of welcome and encouragement to be participants in the service and the life of the parish if the person was new to our congregation.

We are not as rigid now about our behaviour in church as at the beginning of the pandemic in relation to social distancing, wearing of a facemask, shaking hands and singing and providing sandwiches and cakes for morning tea. It is time that we reinvested in the virtue of hospitality as people come to worship on a Sunday morning with a welcoming smile and word and, if they are new to the congregation, how they can follow the service on the words on the two screens in the church. Point out also that morning tea is available at the conclusion of the Eucharist and to share a table with you and other servants of the Servant. This requires a roster of people who are willing to do this service of hospitality to our congregations.

Will you move outside of your comfort zone and offer to perform this virtue of hospitality to other servants of the Servant King? Let me or another of the priests in the parish know in a practical way preferably on paper, of your offer to be a servant in this way that we can renew our parish as one of hospitality to the stranger who is a servant of the Servant King.

Keep well, keep safe, keep social distancing, continue to wear a face mask where needed and the blessing of God be upon you and on all who you love and pray for and may your days and nights be holy, good, and peaceful. **AMEN**

Then the man said, 'You shall no longer be called Jacob, but Israel, for you have striven with God and with humans, and have prevailed.' Then Jacob asked him, 'Please tell me your name.' But he said, 'Why is it that you ask my name?' And there he blessed him. So Jacob called the place Peniel, saying, 'For I have seen God face to face, and yet my life is preserved.' The sun rose upon him as he passed Penuel, limping because of his hip.

A Reading from The Second Letter of Paul to Timothy Chapter 3, verse 10 to Chapter 4, verse 5

Now you have observed my teaching, my conduct, my aim in life, my faith, my patience, my love, my steadfastness, my persecutions, and my suffering the things that happened to me in Antioch, Iconium, and Lystra. What persecutions I endured! Yet the Lord rescued me from all of them. Indeed, all who want to live a godly life in Christ Jesus will be persecuted. But wicked people and impostors will go from bad to worse, deceiving others and being deceived. But as for you, continue in what you have learned and firmly believed, knowing from whom you learned it, and how from childhood you have known the sacred writings that are able to instruct you for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. All scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, so that everyone who belongs to God may be proficient, equipped for every good work.

In the presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who is to judge the living and the dead, and in view of his appearing and his kingdom, I solemnly urge you: proclaim the message; be persistent whether the time is favourable or unfavourable; convince, rebuke, and encourage, with the utmost patience in teaching. For the time is coming when people will not put up with sound doctrine, but having itching ears, they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own desires, and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander away to myths. As for you, always be sober, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, carry out your ministry fully.

The Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke, Chapter 18, verses 1 – 14.

Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ.

Then Jesus told them a parable about their need to pray always and not to lose heart. He said, 'In a certain city there was a judge who neither feared God nor had respect for people. In that city there was a widow who kept coming to him and saying, "Grant me justice against my opponent." For a while he refused; but later he said to himself, "Though I have no fear of God and no respect for anyone, yet because this widow keeps bothering me, I will grant her justice, so that she may not wear me out by continually coming." ' And the Lord said, 'Listen to what the unjust judge says. And will not God grant justice to his chosen ones who cry to him day and night? Will he delay long in helping them? I tell you, he will quickly grant justice to them. And yet, when the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?'

He also told this parable to some who trusted in themselves that they were righteous and regarded others with contempt: 'Two men went up to the temple to pray, one a Pharisee and the other a tax-collector. The Pharisee, standing by himself, was praying thus, "God, I thank you that I am not like other people: thieves, rogues, adulterers, or even like this tax-collector. I fast twice a week; I give a tenth of all my income." But the taxcollector, standing far off, would not even look up to heaven, but was beating his breast and saying, "God, be merciful to me, a sinner!" I tell you, this man went down to his home justified rather than the other; for all who exalt themselves will be humbled, but all who humble themselves will be exalted.'
